Food Truck Rally—Sunrise Boundless Playscape



Sunrise Rotary club completed a needs assessment on its Sunrise Playscape after vandals destroyed the puppet house/theater. It was determined that additional handicap accessible play equipment was needed because of the increased usage. Prior to the Playscape opening in 2009 the vehicle count at the Sedgwick County per year was 550,000; in 2015 it was over a million. The number of occupants per vehicle is unknown, but if you assume 4, that makes the overall estimate usage at a million kids and parents per year. (Some of the vehicles were buses - Wichita School District sent 70 bus loads last year.)

On September 7th the Sunrise Club along with an organization called "Friends of the Playscape" went before the Sedgwick County Commissioners to get approval for a new 10 year agreement, allowing the expansion of the current equipment to include numerous pieces of equipment, including a wheelchair accessible Maze, a family swing, and a new walking track with additional equipment to provide shade. This 3-ear \$1Million Dollar Capital Campaign will kick off with the "Food Truck Rally" on September 30. Read more about it on page 6.

No, it just seems to me that we entice people into our clubs with a promise of a treat – fun, fellowship and feeling good about the work of Rotary. We say things like "come and join this great group of people for lunch." "We meet weekly and enjoy a stimulating program from someone in our community." "It doesn't take a lot of your time." "It's a great place to network with other professionals." The person joins our club and then (said with an ominous sounding voice - don, don, don) we trick them. The new member finds out that there is more to Rotary than just a

weekly lunch meeting with friends or a weekly program and networking to improve his/her business. We trick them by not giving expectations of what it means

So the question remains, does your club do justice to prospective members by giving a "real picture" of its programs, expectations and commitments? Do we offer a treat of engagement and enjoyment from Rotary membership only to "trick" the prospective member into joining without the "real picture" of our club and the work it takes to be a positive force in the community? If we trick our new members, do we run the chance of the new members leaving the club after only a short time and giving our club a bad name in the community?

Metaphorically, as a prospective member rings the bell of your Rotary Club door and yells – "we want to be a member," let's view this as a moment of trick or treating. Do we offer the treat of being a Rotarian or do we trick just to get a new member? It is up to you and your club!

PLAY IT FORWARD CAPITAL CAMPAIGN TO BE LAUNCHED

Press Release

Play it Forward, a new \$1 million capital campaign in support of the Sunrise Boundless Playscape in Sedgwick County Park is underway.



The official launch of the three-year campaign is Friday night, September 30, from 5p – 8p. Organizers will host a Food Truck Rally and *Play it Forward* event at the Playscape where families with children of **all** abilities can have fun while learning more about the popular Playscape and future expansion plans. Hosts for the event include the Sunrise Rotary – West Sedgwick County and The Friends of the Sunrise Boundless Playscape.

Since its opening in 2008, the Playscape has become a highly popular play destination for thousands of children of **all** abilities The Sedgwick County Park's visitor count rose from approximately 500,000 visitors each year to one million annually. Mark Sroufe, superintendent of Sedgwick County Park and Lake Afton Park credits much of that increase to the Boundless Playscape.

The Sunrise Boundless Playscape today is the result of a community service project of the Rotary Club of West Sedgwick County – Sunrise. "Through the generosity of the community, donors and Sedgwick County we were able to build this Playscape" said Rita Linnens, Sunrise Rotarian and Chairperson of the Friends of the Sunrise Boundless Playscape. "Now we're counting on the community to get excited about the new development and keep the Playscape this incredible play destination for children of **all** abilities for years to come."

While most visitors just think it is a really COOL playground, the Playscape is a uniquely built, *inclusive* playground. It is specially designed for families of **all** abilities to play together. With 70% accessibility, the Playscape substantially exceeds ADA requirements.

"In many parks I cannot access the play area due to the sand, gravel, grass and landscaping, said Tiffany Nickel, USD 259 Special Ed Interrelated Teacher and power wheelchair user. "But the Boundless playground was different. I swung with my students on the Sway Swing. I rolled to the top of the play structures and watched them slide and climb and run around different parts of the equipment. I wheeled throughout the park to watch and interact with all students. It was an amazing experience!"

In 2002 the Sunrise Rotary – West Sedgwick County planned a special community project to commemorate the Rotary International's centennial year. Inspired by the plans and vision of Landscape Architect Steven Perry (McCluggage VanSickle & Perry, now GLMV) to create a playground for children of **all** abilities, the Rotary began a six-year capital campaign raising \$1.5 million dollars in cash and in-kind donations to build this children's innovative, inclusive playscape. In 2005 Sedgwick County donated land in Sedgwick County Park for the Playscape. The 1.3 acre Sunrise Rotary Boundless Playscape, which exceeds ADA guidelines with 70% accessibility, was opened in 2008.

To assist with long-term support of the Playscape, *The Friends of Sunrise Boundless Playscape* was formed which serves as an affiliate organization to the Sunrise Rotary. The organization's primary focus is in fundraising and the creation of community and business relationships that develop greater awareness of the quality-of-life issues, needs and vision of the Sunrise Boundless Playscape for the community.
