

Dear District 5690 Rotarians

It is amazing to believe that there are only three months left in the current Rotary year. I want you to ask yourself and your Club, have you achieved your goals for this year and have you set your goals for next Rotary year? It is an axiom that if you do not set

goals and write them down, you are probably going to accomplish less. Let us review some of those goals in the context of Rotary and your community.

First, have you given at least \$120 to the Rotary Foundation and worked to be sure your Club has given at least \$120 per Rotarian in your Club? From the attached report (pgs. 9-11), it appears that only three Clubs in the District have achieved this goal but many are very close to this goal. Unfortunately some Clubs have given very little or nothing. I consistently heard about your Club's commitment to projects in your local community. If we could achieve a \$120 average for giving per Rotarian in our District, we could generate over \$100,000 for our Clubs' projects and an additional \$100,000 for our Clubs to devote to global projects. If you need help to motivate your Club to



achieve this goal, contact me, Robert Mendoza, Geri Appel, Dave Nygaard or other District leaders who will be glad to come to your Club to promote increased giving to the Rotary Foundation.

Second, has your Club increased its membership by at least 10% this year? If your Club does not

have a written plan to promote and encourage Club membership growth and retention, we can help. We are fortunate in the district to have three Membership Cadre members who have gotten training on membership plans. Kaydee Johnson (Winfield) Jamie Anderson (West Wichita) and Mike Andrusak (Ulysses) are committed to working with a group of Clubs to put together membership plans. If you need help increasing your club membership contact me.

Third, our District Governor Elect Dave Yoder coordinated a great PETS conference in Manhattan earlier this month. The president elects who attended received a lot of motivation to plan and set goals. Now the test is moving to the next level of concrete plans. Look on the District website for the May 9th district Assembly in Dodge City. Yes it is being held next to the casino, so



Paul Harris on the need for Rotary



On February 23, we celebrated Rotary's 110th birthday. Here is a piece that appeared in "Rotary Voices" discussing our Founder, Paul Harris', view on Rotary then (and now).

In *My Road to Rotary*, Paul Harris recalled how his longing for friendship like that he had known in Vermont was one of his inspirations for founding Rotary in 1905. But in 1935, in *This Rotarian Age*, he wrote of the need for Rotary, from a wider perspective:

"It is conceivable that Rotary might have been born under sunnier skies, in a climate more equable, and in a city of mental composure; but many will contend that there could have been no more favor-

able birthplace for Rotary than paradoxical Chicago, where the battle for civic righteousness was being so fiercely waged."

Harris moved to Chicago in 1896, and found it a stark contrast to what he had experienced in his youth in Vermont. In *This Rotarian Age*, he recalls Chicago as a city with poor sanitation, harsh working conditions, corrupt politicians, and economic hardships—"business was in a bad way" and "community spirit was at a low ebb." Yet amidst the corruption and pollution, there were "hundreds of good deeds, unheralded and unknown." Harris includes the recovery from the great Chicago fire of 1871, the creation of Hull House in 1889, and the founding of many universities and museums, as examples of the enthusiasm and determination of community leaders to do good in Chicago. Today, Rotarians remain committed to doing good in their own cities and around the world.

Special Notice and Reminder regarding Friendship Exchange to Russia, May, 2015

Special Notice and Reminder regarding Friendship Exchange to Russia, May, 2015

The Rotary International US-Russian Intercountry Committee has organized a Friendship Exchange with the Russian districts for May, 2015, as was previously announced in the District newsletter. It is still possible for District 5690 to send one or two participants, but anyone wishing to participate should act immediately because of the time necessary to procure visas.

The current itinerary contemplates departing the US for Moscow on May 6, arriving in Moscow on May 7. Commencing May 8, the itinerary generally is fly from Moscow to Simferopol in Crimea on May 8. May 10 go to Krasnodar; May 13, go to Rostov on Don; May 16 to Volgograd; May 19, fly to Moscow; May 22 fly or express train to St. Petersburg (the express train is about 4 hours); then May 24 fly home from St. Petersburg. Victory Day, May 9, is always a major observance in Russia, and there is a war memorial being rededicated or restored in Simferopol. At the end of the visit, in St. Petersburg, the delegation will attend the District Conference for D2220, Western Russia. Estimated cost is \$4000 per person. 



D5690 Renews Partnership with India 3250 Rotary Foundation Global Grant to Provide Dialysis Center

PDG Curtis Dick is pleased to announce that our district received news on February 24, 2015 that a joint Global Grant Application between our District 5690 and the Rotary Club of Jamshedpur East in District 3250 for the purpose of equipping and set-



Our district has enjoyed a long partnership with District 3250, a very poor area that covers two states in the northeast portion of India. Previous matching grants provided clean drinking water to 48 schools throughout the district and funded a transportation bus for children at the Jeevan Jyoti School in Dhanbad for mentally and physically challenged students. The total amount of those previous grants totaled \$78,263.

"I am excited that we are renewing our partnership with our friends in District 3250", said PDG Dick. "The needs are great in India, and our Rotary partners there have a proven track record of providing needed assistance in so many areas such as water and sanitation, literacy, vocational training for women, medical facilities, and more. It is my hope that we can continue to assist them long into the future."



District 3250 identified the need for dialysis centers as a major focus for this Rotary year. Four cities, each with a population of more than two million and no dialysis centers



promoting awareness on causes of renal failure, proper dietary habits, educating care givers, and improving the quality of life for patients.

within 100km, were the most important projects for DG Sanjay Khemka and our trusted partners PDG Sandeep Narang and PDG Kamal Sanghvi. The centers will bring subsidized services to patients, as well



Rotary Club of Jamshedpur East has partnered with the Dr. T.C. John Memorial Charitable Trust and the Tata Tinplate Hospital to provide the space necessary to equip the new dialysis center. The Dr. T.C. John Memorial Charitable Trust has committed to hire experienced technicians who have already been working in other dialysis centers with similar equipment to that which will be installed.

PDG Dick and PDG Rod Kreie visited District 3250 in April and May, 2008 via a Rotary Foundation Volunteer Service Grant to view previous water projects and to plan partnership projects for the future. "While water and sanitation, literacy, and vocational training for women are at the forefront of identified needs there, the immediate need for dialysis centers prompted the current Global Grant," said Dick. "We are pleased and thankful that The Rotary Foundation agreed that the need is real and immediate. I also want to thank District 5690 Rotarians who generously give to the Annual Programs Fund of The Rotary Foundation. Your contributions make a huge difference in the lives of those who have many needs, and you are making the world a better place to live – one project at a time."

Panama Water Sanitation Project Update

Our club (West Sedgwick County Sunrise) is participating in a matching grant project to provide water sanitation to Tangara. I have included below a section taken from the actual grant that describes the situation to convey the impact of this project:

"Sanitation is virtually non-existent for more than 2.5 billion people – 38% of the world's population. People are forced to defecate in open places and rivers, contaminating their drinking water source. This devastating lack of sanitation perpetuates the endless cycle of waterborne disease, sickness and death. Lack of proper sanitation represents more than half the sources of gastrointestinal diseases caused by waterborne bacteria, viruses and worms. Inadequate sanitation is yet another inhibitor for the developing world, stripping people of their dignity and ability to lead productive lives. The community of San Miguel de

Tangarara is no different than millions of communities across the world that lack adequate sanitation facilities. The regional government lacks resources to tackle these problems and promote development.



Children are sick and missing school. Parents are trapped, desiring more for their families. Without help, there is little hope for this forgotten community with underdeveloped infrastructure. The majority of this community obtains their household income as agricultural laborers. The average household income is \$50 USD per month. The community has agreed to provide their own sand material, provide labor for digging individual seepage pits and mixing concrete." Dave received this e-mail update on the project:

I am excited to inform you that the safe water system at Tangara was commissioned on Feb 21st. Safe water is flowing and now we have begun the sanitation portion in earnest. I expect that we will finish the phase 1 installation of



latrines near the end of March and then we will immediately start installing the phase 11 that your club has so graciously agreed to help with.



ANNUAL FUND BANNER RECOGNITION STATUS REPORT

For Rotary Fiscal Year: 2014 - 2015

Below is an explanation of some Annual Fund Banner Recognition Status Report columns:

1-July Members: Each club's starting membership figure based on its July semiannual report forms, received at RI by 30 September each year.

Annual Fund Per Capita: The total amount, in U.S. dollars (USD), given to the Annual Fund (SHARE, World Fund, and Areas of Focus) divided by the 1-July Members, or, for new clubs, the Current Members.

Current Members: The current total active members (not honorary) or, for previous Rotary year reports, the total active members on 30 June.

EREY Members: The total Current Members who contributed some amount to the Annual Fund during the Rotary year.

EREY Banner: 'Y' = Those clubs who had 100 percent participation in EREY by Current Members and an Annual Fund Per Capita of US\$100 or higher.

SM Members: The total Current Members who contributed US\$100 or higher to the Annual Fund during the Rotary year.

SM Banner: 'Y' = Those clubs who had 100 percent of their Current Members contribute US\$100 or higher to the Annual Fund.

During the year, most clubs experience changes in club membership, including new members, changes in members' contact information, and membership terminations. To ensure accuracy of this report, communicate all changes to RI as soon as they become effective, using Member Access, the Membership Data Form, or your club or district database if they are integrated with RI through OneRotary. The Rotary Foundation cannot update membership information. Be sure to notify your district governor and update club records.

Yearend membership figures are received from Rotary International records and will change for prior years if the membership information is updated.

This report displays a club's current progress toward becoming an Every Rotarian, Every Year Club; a 100% Rotary Foundation Sustaining Member Club; and the Top Three Per Capita in Annual Fund Giving banner recognitions. This is only a current status reports. Banner recipients listed here may fluctuate due to changes in membership and additional or redistributed contributions. Final certification is processed by The Rotary Foundation following the close of the Rotary year.
