One way to help prepare new leaders is to

encourage all Rotarians to have a Rotary Elevator Speech. All leadership (as well as all Rotarians) need to be able to quickly explain Rotary to community contacts, service partners and perspective members.

What is Rotary? We have many ways to explain Rotary, such as:

- Using our long-standing moto "Service Above Self"
- Using our new vision "Together, we see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves."
- Using the 2017-18 RI President's theme of "Rotary Makes a Difference" or the 2018-19 theme of "Being the Inspiration".
- Using one of your club's signature projects or Rotary International's signature project of "Rotary is ending Polio globally"
- Using your own Rotary story of why you joined Rotary and why you stay in Rotary.

No matter the way you explain Rotary, it is necessary to have a compelling, well thought out 30 second elevator speech. Therefore, incoming Presidents – as you begin your planning and have goal-setting sessions, challenge your leadership team members to share their elevator speech. We know Rotary is important, let's all share why it is important to our colleagues, friends and strangers we meet in the elevator.



Open World Program—Women in STEM



The Rotary Club of West Wichita is coordinating an Open World Program delegation visit to Wichita from March 9 through March 17. The delegation is all Russian women working in the STEM fields (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math). There are 5

delegates and a facilitator from various parts of Russia.

As background, at a Graduate Women International Conference in Cape Town, South Africa in August 2016, a new Russian-American initiative was announced to expand women's professional contribution in the STEM fields. Changing societal norms and increasing women's ability and representation in technical fields will help to ensure the application of technological thinking to the exercise of finding solutions for issues that particularly affect women, and the development of opportunities that would particularly benefit them. The program would look at U.S. programs designed to create programs that create opportunities and encourage girls/women to participate in STEM education and careers and would be targeted to government officials and civic leaders charged with development of school curriculums and outside activities, youth leaders, and advocates of increased opportunities for girls and women.

The focus of delegates' time will be exposure to various STEM-related programs in our area and how the Open World Program supports two of the Rotary causes: Promoting Peace and Supporting Education.

Rotary Service in Ecuador—Rotary Project Fair

Editor's Note: Rotarian Dana Stahl is a relatively new member (2 years) of the Rotary Club of Newton. Originally from northern Michigan, she is the district manager for the Harvey County Conservation department. She calls herself a dog rescuer and volunteers with Heartstrings Animals Advocates, a 501c3 res-

cue organization that saved 400 dogs through a fosterbased program. She recently returned from a Rotary service trip in Ecuador spurred by an email that caught her interest. Here is her story.

When the email came out for the Rotary Project Fair in Ecuador I saw it and immediately thought wow, that sounds so cool. I remember I was visiting my sister in Michigan and said, "Hey I think I'm going to do this!" I didn't know even what it all was about, but I knew Ecuador sounded like a neat place to go and what better way to see the world than traveling with a purpose! I love volunteering (why I joined Rotary in the first place!) and thought it would be amazing to be a small part of helping a Country in another continent of the world! I didn't want to go alone completely so when no other Rotarians stepped up to go, my friend Jessie Stroud who is considering becoming a Rotarian, offered to accompany me.

We arrived in Guayaquil, Ecuador's largest city, quite late but as they'd said a shuttle was waiting to take us to our hotel. We were pleasantly surprised that the hotel accommodations were amazing and the breakfast we had there was the best we've ever had! Experiencing a 6.2 earth quake was a new experience also especially as it happened 20 minutes before we were told there would be a drill!

Ecuador was an amazing Country to travel in – diverse, vibrant and entertaining. I loved that we were able to visit the coast then stay on the Islands of the Galapagos and see many endemic animals and plants and then end in the Mountains in Quito on my birthday! I look forward to going on a Rotary trip again in the future and was happy to meet

other Rotarians and learn about their time in Rotary and their lives.

The project - Jubal Adopt a Village – really struck a chord with me as I grew up on a dairy farm and in a rural community. The project is a multi-year global grant sponsored by a Rotary club in Ecuador. I loved the video that the teenagers put together describing the needs of the town. It

really seems like a sustainable thing they are trying to set in place also with being self-sufficient and creating ways to make a living.

Our Newton club is considering ways to support the project and I'm excited to begin my first International project experience. I plan to return to Jubal when the project is complete and meet the community and see what they have done.

Rotary Club Winfield Prepares to Celebrate its 100th Anniversary: The Rotary Club of Winfield will host a groundbreaking ceremony for the Performance Venue project on Saturday, March 3 at 1:00 p.m. in Island Park, west of

the playground. The project is estimated to be completed in May. The Rotary Club is working in partnership with the City of Winfield and with the support of community to complete the Performance Venue project in celebration of the club's 100th Year of service in Winfield.

The pre-fabricated portions of the structure, which are engineered to optimize acoustic performances, will be installed when the site preparation and foundation work are completed. The Performance Venue will be available for community use, including musical and theatrical performances as well as weddings and other events beginning this summer.

"The Island Park Performance Venue is truly a collaborative effort," said Lucy Herlocker, Winfield Rotary Centennial Committee Chair. "Over the course of nearly two years our committee convened many community partners to identify a project that would improve the quality of life in Winfield and the performance venue emerged an exciting and clear choice."

The total cost of the venue is estimated to be \$150,000, to

date the group has received contributions totaling nearly \$110,000. In order to complete project, the club hopes to raise remaining funds before the end of April. The structure will include a space for donor recognition.

Murder of Polio Vaccinators: The New York Times

Two polio vaccinators — a mother-daughter team — were cine drops to every child under 5. shot dead in Pakistan on 22nd January, the first time in two years that the polio eradication drive had been shaken by assassinations.

While tragic, the killings in Baluchistan Province will not seriously disrupt Pakistan's eradication drive, said one of its leaders.

"We are very close to winning the battle," said Aziz Memon, a textile executive who heads Rotary International's local polio vaccination efforts.

Last year, Pakistan had only eight confirmed cases of polio paralysis; four years ago, the nation had 306.

The only other country with continuing transmission of polio is Afghanistan, which had 14 cases last year, most of them in provinces adjoining Pakistan and among Pashtuns, the predominant ethnic group in border areas.

The two countries now coordinate their national vaccination days, in which more than 200,000 part-time canvassers in Pakistan and 40,000 in Afghanistan try to give vac-

Two years ago, the blast of a suicide bomber near a polio center in Quetta, the province's main city, killed a local official and 13 police officers assigned to guard vaccination teams. The Pakistani Taliban claimed responsibility.

The Taliban in Afghanistan have never opposed polio vaccine; hostility to it by some factions of the fragmented Pakistani Taliban has largely faded in the last two years, Mr. Memon said.

But there is persistent hostility between Pakistan's military and clan militias in some mountainous border areas that have never been fully under government control.

The vaccinators, a 38-year-old woman and her 16-yearold daughter, were each shot in the head by motorcycleriding assassins, the Pakistani authorities said. Mr. Memon said he would go to Quetta to con-sole and compensate the widower, a truck driver with six other children. In the past, Rotary has given the families of murdered vaccinators thousands of dollars.

The rating reflects Charity Navigator's assessment of how the Foundation uses donations, sustains its programs and services, and practices good governance and openness.
