
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Message from District Governor Ivanhoe Love, Jr.

D5680 & D3250 (India) Dialysis Project is Complete


PDG Curtis Dick and Rotarian Devendra Jena of the Rotary Club of Jamshedpur (India) are pleased to announce that the dialysis center at St. Joseph's Hospital in Jamshedpur has



been completed. The center is serving economically compromised patients with affordable or free dialysis, as well as promoting awareness on causes of renal failure, proper dietary habits, educating care givers, and improving the quality of life for patients. The project was made possible by a Rotary global grant in the amount of \$30,750.

Our district has enjoyed a long partnership with District 3250, a very poor area that covers two states in the northeast portion of India. Previous matching grants have provided clean drinking water to 48 schools throughout the district, rainwater harvesting at a small village, a transportation bus for children at the Jeevan Jyoti School in Dhan-

bad for mentally and physically challenged students, toilets and sanitary water for 30 girl schools in the district, and a previous dialysis center in Jamshedpur. The total amount of 7 grants from 2005 - 2022 is \$195,164. Three more global grants are in the application stage that, if approved, will add another \$157,386 to our partnership in the areas of eye care,



"I am excited that we are continuing our partnership with our friends in District 3250" said PDG Dick. "The needs are great in India and our Rotary partners there have a proven track record of providing needed assistance in so many areas such as water and sanitation, literacy, vocational training for women, medical facilities, and more. It is my hope that we can continue to assist them long into the future."



PDG Dick and PDG Rod Kreie visited District 3250 in April and May, 2008 via a Rotary Foundation Volunteer Service Grant to view previous water projects and to plan partnership projects for the future. "We are pleased and thankful that The Rotary Foundation continues to agree that the needs in District 3250 are real and immediate", said Dick. "I also want to thank District 5680 Rotarians who gener-

ously give to the Annual Programs
Fund of The Rotary Foundation. Your
contributions make a huge difference
in the lives of those who have many
needs, and you are making the world a
better place to live – one project at a
time."

While preparing for the Buffalo Chip tournament at Meadow Lake Golf course, a well-known Colby man collapsed. Fortunately, one of our own Rotarians, Andrew Flanagin, was nearby. He, had recently learned CPR,

and was able to provide assistance until the ambulance arrived. It is my understanding that when Andrew started, there was no heartbeat at all. After receiving a quadruple bypass in Hays, all the physicians there agreed that Andrew's efforts were lifesaving.

Although Andrew was not necessarily acting as a Rotarian, he exemplified what it means to be a Rotarian, Andrew was born in 1992; the Rotary International themes were: Look



Beyond Yourself and Real Happiness is Helping Others. Last year our theme was Serve to Change Lives This year, it is Imagine Rotary.

I doubt Andrew imagined he would be literally saving a life this year. I do not

want to embarrass him or create unwanted attention; however, I do want to say Thank You. "You have



lived the 2018-2019 theme: Be the Inspiration. You are indeed an inspiration to me, and to all of us in the Colby club and to Rotarians in District 5680, to be prepared, to be people of action and to Lend A Hand (2003-2004) whenever needed. Thank You, Andrew Flanagin."



Rotary Club Atwood: District 5680 2022-23 District Governor Ivanhoe Love visited our club today. The gavel was passed from









be offered. I took this same trip

We are thrilled to announce that we will be taking a group to India to participate in a National Polio Immunization Day this September. You can find information on our website: www.HowardTours.net

In 2015, India was declared polio free, and polio is now endemic in only two countries. As a result, there are fewer and fewer opportunities to participate in a NID worldwide. This may be one of the last opportunities you will have to join a trip to participate in polio NID activities.



Trip Highlights: We travel to Delhi, India to participate in the polio NID activities and attend other related Rotary events. In addition, we travel to Agra to visit the Taj Mahal, and the magnificent Pink City of Jaipur to visit the famous Rotary Jaipur Limb factory.

Date of Departure: Friday, September 09, 2022
Date of Return: Tuesday, September 20, 2022

Per person cost, based on double occupancy: \$2,599.

This price includes hotel accommodations, most meals, sightseeing, Rotary events, participation in the NID activities, transfers, English speaking guide, and other items as stated in the attached document.

This price does not include international, roundtrip airfare or Indian visa fees. Participants are free to secure their own air reservations using their frequent flyer mileage, or individual purchase. Howard Tours will be happy to help you purchase airline tickets, which can be requested on the trip application.

To mitigate the risk of COVID, the size of this group will be limited, and all participants must be fully vaccinated.
