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Message from District Governor Kurt Harper

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

It is hard to believe the Rotary year is halfway done, but here it is January already. It is time to take a midterm assessment of how I feel our District doing, and some of the lessons learned on the Rotary Road Trip that continues into next month. I have to say that, while there have been a few speed

bumps and pot holes along the way, our travels have been exceptionally rewarding, and I have an even deeper love of our organization, and our expanded district, than I had at the outset!

As of this writing, although I didn't make my lofty goal of visiting all 60 clubs before District Conference, or even before the end of the calendar year, we will have finished 57 club visits by the end of this month; and the final three clubs are all set in February. Our club visits have been great—but along the way we have learned, sometimes too late, of club events that would have been fun to take part in in lieu of a traditional meeting.

So, *Lesson Learned Number One*: If your club has a special event that you would like DGE Dana Brewer to attend, let him know about it when you spend time with him at PETS, or immediately after, so these can get on the calendar.

Our most recent membership totals are down for the district on a year-to-date basis, but this is due, in part, to some data



corrections made at the first of the year and do not represent a true loss of members overall much beyond normal attrition. After factoring that in, the numbers show pretty stable membership. That said, it would be nice to work towards increased numbers in the future within our clubs, and the district as a whole—and perhaps in terms

of the number of clubs.

Lesson Learned Number 2: Each club would be well served by establishing membership goals and developing a plan of action focused on both retention and recruitment. This year's Presidential Citation includes, as one of its avenues of success, having a membership committee and meeting several achievable marks.

Our club visits confirm the generosity of Rotarians. I feel that Kelly and I have gotten the word out to clubs that your contributions to your communities are extremely valuable; but I feel we also have communicated the ways we can further Rotary's good works—in the world at large and here at home—by supporting the Rotary Foundation.

Lesson Learned Number 3: at a district and club level, having a goal, and a plan to meet that goal, for Foundation giving is an important part of broadening our collective Rotary experience and building club success.

I see a theme emerging from these re-

marks. As I reflect on the last six months, I realize that the *biggest lesson I have learned is the value of planning.*

That is a convenient observation, because now is the best time for all of us—the District, the clubs, and our members—to develop a plan for 2020-21. What does your club want or need from the District? How can you best share your Rotary experience in a governor's visit? What are the special characteristics of your community that you can connect with? What special needs can you address this year, and next? Start the dialog now—and build up for a great Rotary Year 2020-21. Incoming Presidents form your committees now; prepare to take action before "your" year starts. When you get the criteria for the Presidential Citation for 2020-21, plan on how your club can attain it.

As I write this, DGE Dana is in San Diego for International Assembly. He will spend a week with his classmates from

all over the world exploring ways that District Governors can help clubs achieve their goals. He will meet with us just a few weeks from now, at the President Elect Training Seminar in Wichita March 26-28. He is planning a great year, and will be eager to learn about your plans for the year as well. Help him to help your club attain its next level of greatness in the year to come!

Australia Disaster Relief



Earlier this month, a request from Australia District 9570 forwarded to each club for contributions to the Drought and Fire Relief fund they have established to assist in the pur-

Call for District 5680 Governor Nominations for 2022 - 2023

The month of November begins the process for selecting the District 5680 Governor for the 2022-2023 Rotary year. One of the most important things a club can do is to allow the district to benefit from your club's leaders by encouraging them to be a District 5680 leader.

Clubs are invited to submit their suggestions for nomination for Governor of District 5680 for the Rotary Year 2022-2023 (July 1, 2022—June 30, 2023) no later than January 15, 2020. To be eligible for Governor, a candidate must have the qualifications and agree to accept the duties of a Governor as set forth in the 2019 Manual of Procedure (MOP). DG Kurt Harper has sent copies of the applicable pages of the MOP as well as other important documents related to the nomination of a district governor to all club presidents via email.

Pertinent dates for the District Governor Nomination process are as follows:

- November 20 District Governor invited clubs to submit suggestions to the nominating committee in an official call to all club presidents via email. Candidates submitted will be considered by the nominating committee.
- Dec / Jan Additional announcements for District Governor will be published in the December and January issues of the monthly newsletter.
- January 15 Deadline for the receipt by either the governor or the nominating committee chair of club nominations of District Governor candidates.

February 15 Deadline for selection of nominee for governor by the nominating committee. The nominating committee chair will promptly notify all candidates of the decision.

This position is challenging but very rewarding and you are asked to review your member list and consider nominating a candidate. If you have questions, call any committee member.

January is Vocational Service Month




The concept of Vocational Service is rooted in the Second Object of the "Object of Rotary" which states: "High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful

occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society".

As leaders in their businesses and professions, Rotarians can advance high ethical standards by setting a positive example among employees, associates, and the community in general. All types of work-related interaction offer an opportunity to encourage ethical behavior.

Promoting integrity through ethical behavior is an essential part of what it means to be a Rotarian. Two standards developed by Rotarians — The Four-Way Test and the Rotary Code of Conduct - provide a road map for ethical behavior in the workplace and other areas of life.





Promoting Peace in Africa & Beyond

Rotary has launched its first Rotary Peace Center in Africa to train leaders who can focus on the underlying threats to peace in the region. Learn how you and your club can support the new peace center and Rotary's peace program.

The peace center at Makerere University in Kampala, Uganda, will offer a professional development certificate, with its first peace fellows beginning their studies in early 2021. The certificate program will emphasize issues and solutions that are especially relevant in Africa and will provide practical experience to supplement coursework in areas such as human rights, governance and media, climate change, and refugee migration. Makerere will become the second Rotary Peace Center to offer a professional development certificate. Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, became the first in 2005. Makerere University is in the heart of the African Great Lakes, a region that has experienced political instability, civil war, ethnic hostilities, and genocide. The university created a peace studies program more than 20 years ago. Rotary Peace Fellows at Makerere will learn how to influence policies and take action to transform society through Positive Peace. More than just the absence of violence, Positive Peace puts in place the structures, institutions, and attitudes that allow peace to flourish.


Rotary International is also creating a leadership and communication curriculum for Rotary and Rotaract members that will be available in English next year, with release in all Rotary languages by 2021.
