District Conference is only a month away! We need YOU there!

The District 5670/5690 Conference is only a month away! It will be held October 19-20 in Russell at the Fossil Creek Inn and Suites. We'll begin at 5:00 on Friday evening and wrap up at 8:00 on Saturday night. Attached to this newsletter is the Schedule of Events and Registration Form. The Registration Form includes lodging information. Please share this with all of your club members.

This District Conference will be a great way for you to get to know the wonderful Rotarians from District 5670. We have had the pleasure of working very closely with District 5670 leaders for the past year, and we're excited that we have the opportunity to join forces with them to create our new District 5680 and to do even more good in the world!

A couple of very important additional points:

District Merger: On Saturday morning, we will be having a business meeting to review and vote upon several important documents related to our merger with District 5670 into the newly formed District 5680. Those documents are available on our website (<https://rotary5690.org/SitePage/district-merger>) and are as follows:

1. **Notice of the Meeting** – This document provides official notice of the meeting of the members of Rotary International District 5680, Inc.
2. **Resolution to Incorporate** – The leadership of Districts 5670 and District 5690 are recommending our new District 5680 be incorporated under the laws of the State of Kansas. This Resolution to Incorporate will need a 2/3 majority vote of the clubs in our combined District 5680 in order to pass.
3. **Merger Agreement** – Provided for your information.
4. **Articles of Incorporation** – Provided for your information.

5. **Bylaws** – The leadership of Districts 5670 and District 5690 spent many hours drafting the Bylaws of District 5680. These bylaws were designed to reflect the traditions and best practices of both districts.

6. **Budget** – The budget reflects the funding priorities of both District 5670 and District 5690, without significantly changing the assessments paid by the clubs in either district. Annual dues of \$23 per member will remain unchanged.

7. **Graduate Student Scholarship Policy** – Since 1949, District 5670 has been providing Graduate Student Scholarships for in-bound foreign students and out-bound students from our district who are studying in a foreign country. This scholarship program will continue in District 5680. The assessment for this program in the new District 5680 will be \$5 per member.

Please share these documents with your boards and your membership and be prepared to vote on them at District Conference.

Auction to benefit The Rotary Foundation: The annual Rotary Foundation auction will be held Friday evening. Each club is asked to provide an item worth \$100 - \$150. Buyers write their checks directly to The Rotary Foundation, so you know exactly where the proceeds are going. **Let's bring some great stuff to the auction and raise at least \$5,000 to benefit The Rotary Foundation! The club that donates the item that brings the highest bid will receive a special prize, so get creative!**

Merger of Districts 5670 & 5690 Update

The Committee assigned to work out the details of the merger of Districts 5690 and 5670 has largely completed its assignment. Chaired by District 5670 DG Andrea Krauss and District 5690 PDG Curtis Dick, the committee was tasked with finding consensus on by-laws, committee formation, district conference timing, whether to incorporate the new district, and resolving differences in budgeting between the two districts.

The committee has had representatives from both districts in attendance at each meeting, including DGE Kurt Harper (from current D5690) and DGN Dana Brewer (from current D5670), PDGs from both districts, and the Executive Secretary/Treasurer Kent Erb. Several meetings of the committee were held in McPherson, and a facilitated planning session was held in Great Bend.

Early in the process, DGs Andrea and Sterling decided to conduct a JOINT District Conference this year, ahead of the final merger. That conference will be October 19-20, 2018 in Russell, Kansas. Conference will provide us all a chance to get acquainted with our expanded Rotary family, and to take action on the final details of the merger. Plan on attending to learn more about the positive impact this merger will have and to participate!

Shelter Box News: The Need Exists, the Need Persists

The most recent natural disaster where Shelter Box has provided assistance is on the island of Lombok, one of the many in the Indonesian Chain.

ly by cooperating with the Shelter Box Response team to deliver assistance, to translate messages and to provide transportation.

On Sunday, July 29th over 1,000 households were destroyed by a 6.4 magnitude earthquake and then less than a week later, a 6.9 magnitude quake struck, killing 91 people and destroying 3,000 homes. Two more quakes, measuring 6.9 and 6.3 rocked the island on August 26th. Hundreds of aftershocks have hit the island since August 5th. The total of these have killed 460 people and left thousands displaced on the island.

Shelter Box keeps supplies on several locations around the globe, so aid was quickly dispatched by working with and through the local Rotary Club. A Shelter Box Response team (SRT) was dispatched, consisting of Liz Odell from the UK and Brian Glenn from the US. They are in the country and safe following the additional quakes and aftershocks.

Shelter Boxes stored in Jakarta were and are now being delivered to Lombok. Rotary District 3410 and PDG Eva Kumiaty have helped support disaster relief in the area by storing Shelter Boxes and supplies.,

Lombok has a single Rotary Club and has worked tirelessly

The immediate response to this disaster was possible because of the past support of Rotary Clubs, including gifts from Districts 5670 and 5690.

Shelter Box is currently active in Syria, Iraq, Cameroon, Nigeria, Chad, Niger, Somaliland, Sudan, Kenya, and Ethiopia. Because of the support of many people, Shelter Box has provided shelter to 15,654 families already in 2018.

Focus on RC Derby—Feed a Hungry Child Program

The signature program of 2017-18 DG Robert Mendoza's year was the "Feed A Hungry Child" Program. The idea was to provide funds to enable our local schools to feed children regardless of their account balance. The program was taken to heart by the Derby Rotary Club who worked with Martha Lawson, our school District Food Services Manager and two School Superintendents, Craig Wilford, until his retirement and Heather Bohaty, who took his place. Both are Rotarians. Past Club President Dana Quigley worked hard to make the program a reality and current Club President Eric Gustafson and our Club Board of Directors have continued the program. We received a District Grant and matched it with community and club donations. These funds go to the school district so that every child is fed.

When we received the District Grant, Rob McDonald went to work to create an event to make the presentation fun and an opportunity to give even more. Rob created the "Steal A Lunch" event and the Board supported his efforts. We took funds slated for our lunch catering and added those dollars to the grant. Club members then pledged to bring a lunch and \$5 dollars to the event.

The Felonious King, played by PDG Robert Mendoza was given first chance to steal a lunch from any member, however the member could then pay their \$5.00 to keep it. If they bought back their lunch, they received a crown and a cookie from our Heroine, Mildred (played by our own founding member Jack Gillespie – and he was amazing!) If they chose to let their lunch go, then they had the chance to steal someone else's lunch. Round and round



we went until everyone was fed, and we collected an extra \$85. At the end, we auctioned off the Kings lunch which was a very special steak dinner. The auction collected another \$40.

Our program was Martha Lawson who spoke to us about the impact of the program in our schools and other actions taken by the School District to ensure that all Derby school students would receive a meal and never be turned away. The money collected by our Club and through our District Grant will not solve the problem, but this was a beginning. It is a chance for people to look at a problem differently and find a fun solution that will have lasting effects. We are very thankful to our Rotary District, to our schools and to our Club members for their open hearts, generosity and participation.

This year: Total wild polio cases for 2018: **17.**

Last year: Total wild polio cases in 2017: **22**

AFGHANISTAN: A new cases of type 1 (WPV1) reported 7/8/18. The total number of officially reported WPV1 cases in Afghanistan in 2018 is 13.

PAKISTAN: One new case of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) was reported on 8/1/18. The total number of officially reported WPV1 cases in Pakistan in 2018 is 4.

NIGERIA and THE LAKE CHAD BASIN:

No new cases of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) since 21 August 2016.



So here's the deal. If you ever tried hosting a youth exchange student, it's so fun, you will want to do two of them at the same time!

This year, District 5680 (District 5670 and District 5690) is hosting four foreign exchange students. We were slated to have five, but our girl from India

(Saher Gandhioke to be hosted by Newton Rotary Club) ended up staying in Israel where her father was appointed as an India diplomat for another year. His term had expired, but his reappointment allowed her to finish her high school at the same school she attended her first three years. Newton was really excited for her to come because she is the granddaughter of PDG Surinder Singh, a very active Rotarian in India that has worked extensively with District 5690 on water and sanitation projects in India.

Interesting notes on this year's students:

Diana Santos (Venezuela) is the daughter of Isabel Santos who 30 years ago was an Exchange student in Ulysses, Kansas. This is the second - second generation exchange that Rod Kreie has been involved with.....probably making him too old to still be youth exchange. Diana is hosted by the RC Ulysses.

Ricardo Silva (Mexico) is going to high school in Nicker-
son where his father also was an exchange student. Ri-

cardo's father was not a Rotary Exchange student, but still turned out ok!!! Ricardo is being hosted by Jim and June Gladden - who also hosted Ricardo's father. While the Gladdens couldn't remember the exact number of students they have hosted, they know it's north of 50 and they feel very blessed to have such an extended family. Ricardo is hosted by the RC Hutchinson.

Pol Vilardebo (Spain) is playing football at Ulysses High School and is the kicker. An avid soccer player, the conversion to American futbol has been very fun for Pol. He now knows how to "squib kick" a kickoff so the opponents have a harder time fielding the kickoff. Pol attended a KSU football game and is hooked. Pol is hosted by the RC Ulysses.

Marilia Saboya (Brazil) comes from Fortaleza, Ceara, Brazil which has been a very rich partner in youth exchange. 
