- A proven track record of partnering with local governments and organizing projects addressing HIV/ADIS, TB, malaria, polio, dengue fever and many others.

- The Rotary Foundation has funded almost 2,000 projects and programs to build healthier communities around the world.
- Rotary Foundation grant activity in this area shows that Rotarians have broad sector interests and strong local impact.
- The greatly increased use of Rotarian Vocational Training Teams are providing health care training and provision of on-site services in many areas of disease treatment around the world.

## Rotary is that perfect gift!



Here it is the holiday season and many of us spend time thinking of the perfect gift to give a family member or friend. We give gifts to coworkers, customers and pro-

fessional colleagues of boxes of nuts, candy or other material things to thank them for their hard work, business or career support. *Perhaps it is time to give a lasting gift!* 

As Rotarians and leaders in your club, we know intrinsically how much we get back from being a Rotarian and the benefits we receive from serving those in need in our community. However, now there is research and data which show volunteering has benefits. As Mark Horoszowiki stated in an online article appearing on the Forbes.com website, "Science is now showing us what great leaders and philosophers have known for years, 'One of the great ironies of life is this: He or she who serves almost always benefits more than he or she who is 5. served.'" – Gordon Hinckle"

So what does the data present to us?

- Volunteering time makes you feel like you have more time. In a Harvard Business Review article, Cassie Mogilner, Wharton professor, found those who volunteer their time feel like they have more of it. Said Mogliner: "The results show that giving your time to others can make you feel more 'time affluent' and less time-constrained than wasting your time, spending it on yourself, or even getting a windfall of free time."
- Volunteering is an excellent opportunity to develop your talents and advance in your career. An article in Stanford Social Innovation Review called skills-based

- volunteering overseas "the next executive training ground."
- 3. Volunteers are healthier. A Corporation for National and Community Service reports "Research demonstrates that volunteering leads to better health...those who volunteer have lower mortality rates, greater functional ability, and lower rates of depression later in life than those who do not volunteer."
- 4. Volunteering your experience helps build your experience. Volunteering in a new industry gives you knowledge to help you switch fields. The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal and Next Avenue have published articles addressing this and stated "According to the survey of 202 human-resource executives, skilled volunteer work such as helping a nonprofit with its finances makes job applicants look more appealing to hiring manager."
- 5. Volunteering your love makes you feel more love. Admittedly, love is a hard thing to measure. But when researchers at the London School of Economics examined the relationship between volunteering and measures of happiness, they found the more people volunteered, the happier they were. Volunteering builds empathy, strengthens social bonds and makes you smile all factors that increase the feeling of love.

Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok celebrates its 10th year as a Rotary Peace Center. Rotarians, peace fellow alumni and friends celebrated the 10th anniversary during a recent conference titled "Innovating Global Peacebuilding." The conference focused on grassroots peacebuilding efforts and how to bridge the gap between theory and practice

The Chulalongkorn program offers a professional development certificate to individuals already working in fields related to peace. Because of the relatively short commitment and the emphasis on relevant experience, the program attracts a broad pool of applicants. To date Chulalongkorn has graduated 355 peace fellows from 60 countries.

Through its six peace centers, Rotary is development leaders to become catalysts for peace in their communities and around the globe. Unlike the 15-24 month master's degree program, the Chulalongkorn course lasts just three months. Its curriculum emphasizes equal parts instruction and learning from peers. Professors from both Thailand and outside the country as chosen each year for a curriculum that is constantly changing. Fellows also complete two field studies, one in Thailand and one in a post-conflict setting outside Thailand where they put their training into action.
