- Wire transfers: Must be initiated prior to Wednesday, June 30, 2021 and received by Wednesday, July 1, 2017. Please do NOT send in checks for the 2021-22 Rotary year until July 1, 2021. All checks received with June postmarks go toward 2020-21 contributions.

Foreword

by H.R.H. The Duke of Edinburgh

The sheer size of Rotary International in 1984 is impressive. Almost 1 million members in 158 countries are awesome statistics, but they really mean nothing at all unless the members are inspired by Rotary's challenging philosophy, expressed by its splendidly simple motto "Service Above Self". The motto would be irrelevant if there were no selfishness in the world, but the temptation to cheat, to exploit and to dominate for the sake of personal wealth and power has always been a feature of human existence and the chances are that it always will be.

The significance of Rotary is that it has become one of the most active and effective lay forces on the side of righteousness, cooperation and goodwill. It provides, therefore, a most powerful encouragement of the potential for good that is in all men and by so doing it also acts as a severe restraint on what is evil and corrupt. It is no coincidence that Rotary flourishes in the free and open societies of this world while it is ruthlessly suppressed under ideological dictatorships.


This book may not be the only history of Rotary to be written but it is probably the first to trace the course of events and to follow the development of an idea at the same time. What comes through is that while fashions and attitudes may vary between countries and over periods of time, the central principle and philosophy of Rotary runs through the whole story as if it were the track of the Golden Wheel.

District 5680 Renews Partnership with India D3250 Global Grant to Provide Dialysis Center

PDG Curtis Dick is pleased to announce that our district received news on April 9, 2021 that a joint Global Grant Application between our district and the Rotary Club of Jamshedpur in District 3250 for the purpose of equipping and setting up a two bed dialysis center has been approved by The Rotary Foundation in the amount of \$30,750. District 5680's portion of the grant is \$8,000 and

will be funded through District Designated Funds that come back to our district three years post giving to the Annual Programs Fund of The Rotary Foundation.



Our district has enjoyed a long partnership with District 3250, a very poor area that covers two states in the northeast portion of India. Previous matching grants have provided clean drinking water to 48 schools throughout the district, rainwater harvesting at a small village, a transportation bus for children at the Jeevan Jyoti School in Dhanbad for mentally and physically challenged students, toilets and sanitary water for 30 girl schools in the district, and a previous dialysis center in Jamshedpur. The total amount of 7 grants from 2005 - 2021 is \$195,164.

"I am excited that we are continuing our partnership with our friends in District 3250" said PDG Dick. "The needs are great in India, and our Rotary partners there have a proven track record of providing needed assistance in so many areas such as water and sanitation, literacy, vocational training for women, medical facilities, and more. It is my hope that we can continue to assist them long into the future."

Rotary Club of Jamshedpur has partnered with St. Joseph Hospital to provide the space

necessary to equip the two bed dialysis center. Along with the previous dialysis center at Tata Tinplate Hospital completed in 2015, they





will bring increased subsidized services to economically compromised patients, as well as promoting awareness on causes of renal failure, proper dietary habits, educating care givers, and improving the quality of life for patients. Jamshedpur is a city of 1.5 million.

PDG Curtis Dick and PDG Rod Kreie visited District 3250 in April and May, 2008 via a Rotary Foundation Volunteer Service Grant to view previous water projects and to plan partnership projects for the future. "We are pleased and thankful that The Rotary Foundation agreed that the need is real and immediate", said Dick. "I also want to thank District 5680 Rotarians who generously give to the Annual Programs Fund of The Rotary Foundation. Your contributions make a huge difference in the lives of those who have many needs, and you are making the world a better place to live – one project at a time."

In short, each of our 60 Rotary Clubs will receive one (1) free scholarship, if claimed by the May 8 deadline! Any unclaimed Scholarships will be available to be divided up among the Clubs who request an additional scholarship.



Next, they filled it with food and personal hygiene products, it's been stocked by donations ever since. That was October 2016.

Fast forward to 2021, there are now over 80 Blessing

Boxes scattered throughout the Wichita area, Kansas towns, and other states!

Maggie and Paxton's goal continues to be adding new PBB locations across the United States. All that is needed it the same passion and love to help feed those in need, via sponsorship of a Blessing Box.

OUR CLUB'S INVOLVEMENT...

Our club sponsored the installation of a Blessing Box at Lawrence Elementary. While it will provide food for needy families at the school (many of the families our club services through our Monthly Grocery project and Holiday Groceries) it is open to anyone in the community who is in need. The box provides primarily non-perishable items such as canned goods, dry goods and packaged snacks. We may check in on the box but the Lawrence staff will be in charge of overseeing it. \$15.5 Million Pledge to The Rotary Foundation for Peace Center

An extraordinary gift — a pledge of \$15.5 million — from the Otto and Fran Walter Foundation was made to The Rotary Foundation so that Rotary can establish one of our Rotary Peace Centers in the Middle East or North Africa.

It's long been a stated desire of many Rotarians to establish a peace center in this region. Mainly because of three elements — water, oil, and religion — the Middle East has often

been a cauldron of conflict. We believe that with social understanding and political goodwill, there's still hope for peace and harmony in the Middle East. This is one way that Rotary can make a tangible contribution.

TRF Chair, K R Ravindran shared the story of Otto and



Fran Walter, the extraordinary people whose generosity made this possible here.

The new center will be named the Otto and Fran Walter Rotary Peace Center. The new center will offer a professional development certificate program focused on peacebuilding and development issues in the region. The gift will fund the center's startup costs and operating expenses, as well as an endowment that will provide peace fellowships in perpetuity for up to 40 students to

study there each year. The Rotary Foundation will select a partner institution to host the Otto and Fran Walter Rotary Peace Center in 2024, and the first Rotary Peace Fellows are expected to start studying there in January 2026.


