The Social Change Model—An effective leadership process for Rotary

Leadership can be defined in many ways. The Kansas Leadership Center defines leadership as an activity. Emory University's campus leadership program seeks to develop ethical leadership and "... view the "leader" basically as a **change agent**,

i.e., "one who fosters change." Leaders, then, are not necessarily those who merely hold formal "leadership" positions; on the contrary, all people are potential leaders. Furthermore, since the concepts of "leadership" and "leader" imply that there are other people involved, leadership is, by definition, a collective or group **process**". Many include in a definition of leadership the concept of influencing others and working toward a common goal. Rotary, as a community of leaders, focuses on what this unique and engaged group of leaders can do locally and globally. Regardless of the definition, most would agree that CHANGE is what leaders create.

So how can our Clubs in District 5690 create an environment of action, change and engagement? The Social Change Model is one way to think about the connection between individual and club. In part, we create positive change through individual awareness and organizational efforts. Below is a brief explanation of the Social Change Model.

Positive Change


Change, as the hub and ultimate goal of the model, gives meaning and purpose to the other C's (Consciousness of self, Congruence, Commitment, Collaboration, Common Purpose, Controversy with Civility and Citizenship). Change means improving the status quo, creating a better world, and demonstrating a comfort with transition and ambiguity in the change process.

Individual Values

Consciousness of self means being aware of the beliefs, values, attitudes, and emotions that motivate one to take action.

Congruence refers to thinking, feeling, and behaving with consistency, genuineness, authenticity, and honesty towards others. Congruent persons are those whose actions are consistent with their most deeply-held beliefs and convictions. Clearly, personal congruence and consciousness of self are interdependent.

Commitment is the psychic energy that motivates the individual to serve and that drives the collective effort. Commitment implies passion, intensity, and duration. It is directed towards




person acts with commitment and knowledge of self.

Group Values

Collaboration is to work with others in a common effort. It constitutes the cornerstone value of the group leadership effort because it empowers self and others through trust. Collaboration multiplies group effectiveness by capitalizing on the multiple talents and perspectives of each group member and on the power of that diversity to generate creative solutions and actions. Collaboration empowers each individual best when there is a clear-cut "division of labor."

Common Purpose means to work with shared aims and values. It facilitates the group's ability to engage in collective analysis of the issues at hand and the task to be undertaken. Common purpose is best achieved when all of the members in the group share in the vision and participate actively in articulating the purpose and goals of the leadership development activity. Recognizing the common purpose and mission of the group helps to generate the high level of trust that any successful collaboration requires.

Controversy with Civility recognizes two fundamental realities of any creative group effort: that differences in viewpoint are inevitable, and that such difference must be aired openly but with civility. Civility implies respect for others, a willingness to hear each other's views, and the (continued on next page)

exercise of restraint in criticizing the views and actions of others. This is best achieved in a collaborative framework and when a common purpose has been identified. Controversy (conflict, confrontation) can often lead to new, creative solutions to problems, especially when it occurs in an atmosphere of civility, collaboration, and common purpose.

Societal/Community Values

Citizenship is the process whereby the individual and the collaborative group become responsibly connected to the community and the society through the leadership development activity. To be a good citizen is to work for positive change on behalf of others and the community. Citizen-

ship thus acknowledges the interdependence of all who are involved in or affected by these efforts. It recognizes that the common purpose of the group must incorporate a sense of concern for the rights and welfare of all those who might be affected by the group's efforts. Good citizenship thus recognizes that effective democracy involves individual responsibility as well as individual rights.

Interact Club of West Wichita Serves in Panama



The Interact Club of West Wichita is a service club for our area high school students founded in 2002 and sponsored by our two west side Rotary clubs. The club meets bimonthly throughout the school year and participates in various community service projects.

Every other year, the group travels to Panama as an international service project. The trip gives them the opportunity to provide Service Above Self to the very poor, learn firsthand about a culture outside the US, learn Spanish through an immersion experience, work alongside adult Rotarians in a meaningful work pro-

ject and an opportunity to build long-lasting friendships with those who make the trip and those they meet. This year, 21 Interact students, 1 former Interact member and 6 adult sponsors went to Panama during Spring break, March 13th - 20th. They did two work projects, met with two Interact clubs, visited three high schools, two elementary schools and a girl's home. They took nine containers of supplies to distribute. This trip was made possible in part through their fundraising efforts along with support from our two west side Rotary clubs.

Rotary Provides \$35 million in New Funding

Rotary has released \$35 million in new grants to support the global effort to eradicate polio. The funds will build on last year's historic achievement of stopping transmission of the wild polio virus in Nigeria and all of Africa. Just two countries reported wild polio cases in 2015: Afghanistan and Pakistan. Rotary's funds will go toward efforts to end the disease in though countries and seven others. Read

U.S. Approves \$228 million for 2016

The United States Congress approved a total of \$228 million for the 2016 federal budget to support the global effort to eradicate polio. The funding represents a \$10 million increase over the level of funding approved in fiscal year 2015. Rotary's Polio Eradication Advocacy Task Force for the United States leads our efforts to inform the U.S. government and other funding sources of the urgency and benefits of supporting the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.
