What a unique opportunity for us to listen to her inspirational message and visit with the first woman to serve as the Rotary International President in Rotary's history. You will hear first hand from her as she explains her vision for Rotary.

We have other well known and motivational speakers joining us as well from Rotary International, Zone 25b-29 and our own District all sharing their Rotary knowledge covering several different topics to make this a truly memorable worthwhile event.

This year's PETS will be held at the Wichita Marriott March 31 through April 2. Check-in is Thursday, March 31 between 4-6p. There will be a social 6-8p in the Wichita Ball room. Dinner is on your own and a list of restaurants will be provided.

<u>All participants are encouraged to bring items of cookware</u> to be dropped off at the check-in desk. These items will be collected and given to the Wichita International Rescue Committee who will distribute them to refugees from Afghanistan that are relocating in Kansas.

The following morning breakfast is included in the room rate provided by the hotel. The opening session starts April 1 at 8:30a. A detailed schedule will be provided upon check-in.

RIPE Jennifer Jones will be the keynote speaker Friday evening from 6:30-8:30p with a social gathering preceding dinner from 5:30—6:30p; **a great opportunity for PEs to meet RIPE Jennifer**. We will conclude the evening with Jennifer, joined by Tom Gump and Todd Jenkins, for a panel discussion on diversity, equity, and inclusion.

A special invitation to all PDGs, DGs, DGEs, DGNs, AGs and Committee Chairs—you are invited to a VIP reception 9-10 pm. We hope you will attend!

IMPORTANT: There is a District business meeting scheduled during the last district break out session of PETS. Please attend, as we will vote to approve our 2022-23 budget.



Plan to attend Rotary at the Ball Game! Wednesday, June 1 Game time 7:05 pm Details coming soon! Rotarians from Wichita Area Rotary Clubs (including Derby, Newton, Andover, & El Dorado) were BUSY in January and February as they worked together to welcome families fleeing war-torn Afghanistan and other countries to their new homes in Kansas. The Wichita IRC office

(International Rescue Committee) helps these families find homes, jobs, English classes, etc.



Rotarians compiled and delivered 160 kits to help refugees set up their new households, including dinnerware, kitchenware, cookware, bathroom, hygiene, household items, cleaning and towel kits using new and gently

used items. We also transported two moving truck loads of gently used furniture. LOTS of people were involved in this project, including 29 Rotarians (and their families and friends) for final kit packaging on Presidents Day (Feb. 21) and a similar number on Feb. 26 for kit delivery.

Special thanks to RightSize Moving (a Wichita company that donated two afternoons of service—staff and trucks—to move furniture) and to BRG Precision Products (a Derby



company that donated eight weeks of warehouse space plus staff time and kit packing materials).

The project would not have been successful without their help.

The final phase of the project will occur March 31 when Presidents Elect for Districts 5680 and 5710 and others who attend PETS (Presidents Elect Training Seminar) at the Wichita Marriott will be



asked to each bring one item (stockpot, tea kettle, pots & pans to use in the microwave or oven) so additional Cookware Kits can be assembled.



District 5680 Leadership Transformation Grants

District 5680 has been awarded 30 grants to participate in the programs of the Kansas Leadership Center. The Kansas Leadership Center (KLC) is a non-profit organization committed to fostering leadership for stronger, healthier and more prosperous Kansas communities.

The KLC offers three programs that build on each other:

- Your Leadership Edge is the introductory program that focuses on personal leadership competencies. It helps participants stretch and grow their leadership while addressing their toughest challenges.
- Lead for Change is the advanced, deep dive into individual leadership helping leaders understand how to mobilize others to deal with tough problems and change processes.
- Equip to Lead focuses on communications, integrating leadership principles into the organization, and facilitating real change.



These programs range from \$399 to \$799 in value. The grant allows Rotarians to attend for free.

Who Should Attend?

Each club should consider sending up and coming leaders from their club and community. The virtual sessions are ideal for clubs in western Kansas. Leaders who have done the first program should consider the second and third programs.

How To Register

To Sign Up for one of the three programs, we ask that you do two things:

- Visit the KLC website at: <u>www.kansasleadershipcenter.org</u>. Create a personal account and register using the code Rotary2022 to waive the tuition fee.
