Message from District Governor Dana Brewer

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

Our Time is Now – Rotarians Our World Needs Us!

The Pandemic has reached a critical point at which a great deal of good can be done, if the

needed things are made to happen. The anti-Covid vaccines are highly effective but increased production is necessary. That is happening with additional drug manufacturers stepping up to manufacture the successful vaccines developed by Moderna, Pfizer as well as Johnson & Johnson. President Biden may well invoke the Defense Act to require even more manufacturers to join in, as Ford and others did with PPE. The Center for Disease Control just announced that the vaccines are just as safe as was projected by their drug trials.

The vaccine rollout is not going as well as it should, largely due to every State and every County having been left to implement their own individual plans. Although one size fits all was probably not a better answer, we don't seem to see much in the way of standardized processes and best practices, being shared and implemented.

Despite those challenges, vaccines will become more and more available and Rotarians surely are willing to help, to save the lives of our family members and neighbors. How can we be most effective? First we must do the obvious. We



must wear masks and practice social distancing. New studies show that proper use of double masking is substantially more effective than a single mask. Whatever masking is used, keep it above your nose, so that it protects the air you are

breathing. If you social distance from everyone except those you live with, you will not expose those who have compromised immune systems or who live with those who do. We would not knowingly expose others to a "common" cold or "regular" flu, and Covid Kills!

As Clubs and as a District, we can do much, much more. We can work together with local medical and Health Department personnel to put together local sources of public information about Covid, local efforts to control it, including any mandates in effect, the qualifications, process and timeline for getting vaccines, their effectiveness and the side effects which show the positive response of our immunes systems. DGE Fred Heismeyer is heading up our District's Task Force to help Clubs put together those local public information programs.

District Trainer DeAnn Sullivan is rolling out a public awareness campaign involving [insert picture with 2 smiley faces wearing masks], strategically deployed and moved, around each Club's community (think in front of Hospital, Health Department, Medical Clinics, Court House, Schools, etc.). can be used to cheer up a fellow Rotarian who is ill or homebound, for fund raisers or to mark Rotary events.

The next prong of our attack in the WAC "War Against Covid" is to run public service spots on media such as radio, television, newspapers, social media, billboards and business signs, both locally and Districtwide. Public radio stations KMUW (Wichita), Radio Kansas (Hutchinson), High Plains Radio (Garden City) and KPR (Lawrence) are helping our District and District 5710 (Eastern Kansas) develop such public information and awareness spots to cover virtually all of Kansas and Northern Oklahoma. Those messages tell that vaccines save lives and encourage people to join Rotarians in getting vaccinated, to protect themselves and the people they love and care about.

The final and very possibly most important piece of our Vaccinations for Our Neighbors Project, is YOU! You, as a leader of your community, a respected friend and neighbor who is known for caring about the wellbeing of other people, have a great deal of influence. What better way to share that influence, than to help your neighbors protect themselves and all of us, from the most dread disease of our lifetimes? Equip yourself with the information you need and keep sharing it, until we win the WAC!


Are you using the correct Rotary Logo?

Rotary Club Derby: *Courtesy Derby Informer* - Derby Rotary Club has now seen 40 years worth of meetings, but their meeting on Friday was the first of its kind.

Rotary club members met Friday to celebrate the club's 40th anniversary in the Derby Public Library's parking lot, straight from the comfort of their own vehicles. John Bode, a Rotary member and employee at BRG Precision Products, helped the club broadcast its meeting to members on a specific radio station, similar to a drive-in movie theater.

"We just picked up on this idea and took off with it," said Rob McDonald, president of Derby Rotary Club since July 2020. "We thought it was a wonderful, creative idea."



Since October, the Rotary club has been meeting via Zoom, but McDonald and other members wanted to do something special to mark four decades of activity. The Rotary club also set up a "drive-thru" food pickup, so

members could safely enjoy a meal during the meeting. After handling the usual rotary meeting business, members competed in friendly games of bingo.

Prior to the meeting, McDonald sent out a questionnaire to gather members' favorite experiences and memories throughout the club's history. "I read a lot of those com-

McDonald said the group still has some of its charter members, who helped establish

the club in 1981.

"For me, [Friday's meeting] showed our resilience – that you can't keep any Rotarian down," said McDonald, who has been a member of the Rotary club for eight years. "As for the longevity of our club, it is because of the leaders in our community who have continued to stay with [us] and also pass the torch to other leaders in our community."

McDonald estimated about 30 members attended the car rally.

After the meeting, members attached 40th anniversary signs and balloons to their cars and led a parade through town.

McDonald said the club is planning to host a car show as part of its 40th anniversary celebration on April 10, with a possible raincheck date on April 17. Proceeds from the car show will benefit the club's Feed-a-Hungry Child program, which helps cover meal costs for students in need at Derby Schools.

"It's pretty wild how it's snowballed, way more so than I would have suspected, but it's a really good thing though," Hubka said. "We've had a few community members say, 'Let's become known as a mural town, because all towns are kind of known for something. Maybe someday when people think of Clay Center, they think about this project. Who knows?"


