Like you, my year as District Governor really started many months ago with training and planning for the official start of July 1, 2014.

Thanks to Past District Governor
Sue Pearce and her team of
Presidents and leadership of our
Clubs, we ended last Rotary year
with a positive increase in the number of
Rotarians in District 5690.

We are trying to prepare for and help you benefit from the changes taking place both within our District and at Rotary International. The District has purchased and has online ClubRunner. Susan Ellis is the new District Trainer who will assist clubs in getting the maximum benefit from ClubRunner and Rotary's Club Central, both of which help with tracking membership and Foundation giving for the Clubs. ClubRunner can also be used to help with a Club newsletter and engaging people in your community through social media.

We had the first District Assembly in the district in 5 years. The event in Pratt set the stage for submitting our District grant requests to Rotary International. Through

your efforts, we got over \$83,000 in grants approved generating projects of over \$112,000. Dave Yoder (DGE) and Dean Kennedy (DGN) have agreed to schedule an Assembly each spring so we can annually get our grant requests in early so the funds are available to your Club at the start of the Rotary year. We are also

scheduling a long range planning session for the District to discuss how we can get the maximum return for the other Rotary Foundation contributions.

Gary Huang, our Rotary International President, has established the theme for his year as "Light Up Rotary." As I have listened to the President Elects and leadership of the Clubs at Assembly, I am amazed at how much each of our Rotary Clubs are already doing in their local communities and in the world. Tell those Rotary stories to encourage others to join a Rotary Club, preferably your Rotary Club. Bring in new Rotarians so that the projects you have done yearly will continue long after you are able to actively or financially support those projects.

I have been so proud of the Wichita Club this last year. While I know we are jokingly

2016 Council on Legislation



Every three years, Rotarians meet at the Council on Legislation (COL) to review and vote on proposed legislation. The Council gives us a voice in how our organization is governed. I was honored to represent our district at the 2010 COL

and look forward to once again attending as our representative in 2016.

What the Council Does

Each Rotary district sends a representative to the Council. Representatives deliberate and act upon all proposed Enactments and Resolutions. Enactments seek to change Rotary's constitutional documents: RI Constitution, RI Bylaws, and Standard Rotary Club Constitution. Resolutions seek actions by the Council that do not change the RI constitutional documents. They express an opinion or make a recommendation to the RI Board. The RI Board then reviews and acts on all resolutions adopted by the Council.

Proposing Legislation

The next Council convenes in April, 2016. Proposed enactments and resolutions may be submitted by clubs and districts, though club items must be endorsed by the club's district. Legislation may also be made by the General Council or Conference of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland, the RI Board, and the Council itself.

Deadlines

In order for legislation to be considered in 2016, it must be received at RI headquarters by December 31, 2014. There are no exceptions to this deadline, and club legislation must be endorsed by the district. Therefore, if your club wishes to present an enactment or resolution, our district would need to act on it at our District Conference to be held October 17-19 or October 18-20. In order for the District Executive Committee to have time to review and present at District Conference, please submit all proposed legislation to me or DG Martin Bauer no later than October 1, 2014.

RYLA 2014 - "United We Stand"

A total of 20 high school students from the state attended the RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) Camp on Southwestern's



campus from May 24th - May 28th. Students learned about the responsibilities and possibilities of servant leadership through interactive experiences such as the ropes course at Camp Horizon, leadership lessons taught by SC students minoring in Leadership Studies and a service day at the Winfield Kansas Veterans' Home. The service experience on Memorial Day was particularly meaningful for camp participants. Students attended the Winfield Memorial Day Celebration and then spent the afternoon interviewing and dialoguing with veterans about their experiences, wisdom and challenges. The students also shared an ice cream social with the veterans. At the closing of camp, many students noted lessons learned from their veterans and even wrote poems detailing their experiences.

District Rotary Clubs sponsored the camp costs for students who attended. Additionally, the Winfield Rotary Club of District 5690 played a significant role in the design and implementation of the camp. Member Dean Kennedy helped to orchestrate a Rotary picnic and secured Judge Tommy B. Webb to come and deliver his "You Can Make a Difference" motivational speech to campers.

"Rotary Leadership

Camp is always a powerful experience. In a span of five short days, campers grow and learn things about themselves and others that challenge them to make an impact in their home communities. Campers come to realize that true leadership springs from a desire to serve and make the world around oneself better, and this is a freeing and motivating experience for many of them. They become friends with students from around the state, connect with Rotarians who are living lives of service and are challenged to do something differently when they return home. It is inspiring to witness."


An ethics discussion From RI's Rotary "Vocational Service " email July 2014
