Message from

District Governor Kurt Harper

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

Before reporting to you concerning the rewarding start Kelly and I have had to this Rotary year, I want to focus everyone's attention to two upcoming events that can help acquaint you with our new district.



October 11-13 we will have our **District Conference**. Those of you from the former District 5690 will be interested to learn that in the budgeting process, we redesigned our approach to funding the conference to conform to the methods used in former 5670. Each club has paid, as part of the district dues, an amount allocated to the Conference, which represents payment for delegates to the conference. The assessment is determined by the "electors" each club has—which is proportionate to club size. Please check with your club president to determine if the club's "elector" has been specified. If not, consider volunteering. If an elector is appointed—register and attend anyway! Details for the conference will be issued soon. Watch the district website and Facebook page for details.

Second, as you have heard before, we are in a newly constituted Zone. If you would like to learn more about **district leadership opportunities**, or already have a chair position, look into attending, the **Zone Institute** for all or part of the period

September 24-29, and contact district leadership to see if you qualify for a subsidy. The Institute is in Overland Park, and we would love to have a large showing!

As a final administrative reminder, don't forget to log on to My Rotary to update all club information. That is the best way to keep our data current, and to make sure the officers for your club get critical information from both Rotary International and the District.

Now, on to a report on recent activities. Kelly and I have just returned from an exhilarating week, and I am more excited about Rotary, and our new District, than ever. We started the week of July 8 with the official pin exchange at my home club, the Rotary Club of Wichita (Downtown). A number of PDGs, along with immediate PDGs Sterling Hall and Andrea Krug Krauss, joined us for the occasion, and the club was generous enough to let me use the occasion for my official club visit as well.

The next day we set out for Northwestern Kansas, where I was able to visit clubs in Hoxie, Oberlin, Colby, Sharon Springs, Atwood, and Goodland. My eyes were opened, as I saw firsthand what great contributions these clubs make in their communities—and what great communities they are in! I am really looking forward to

During my senior year, I had the privilege of being a Rotary youth exchange student in Jamshedpur, India. I attended Loyola School where I took Indian Politics, Indian Economics, English, Hindi, Psychology, and Indian History. These classes were a brilliant view not only into the Indian education system, but also many Indian viewpoints on complicated Internal and external political, religious, and economic ideas.

I attended many different Rotary meetings and dinners acting as a socialite at fancy dinner parties. In contrast, I spent a lot of time trying to become friends with Indians of all caste and creed from street criminals, dancers, and motorbike racers to village leaders and budding entrepreneurs. Given my new, unique social status I traveled the country as a cultural ambassador, representing America and Rotary International. Specifically, I held talks

about education, my country, agriculture, politics, and more. My speaking skills expanded as I learned to speak to school groups as large as 3,000 or speak professionally to a diverse array of business leaders across India. I also spent time sitting down with military leaders, politicians, and ministers and even had the opportunity to meet with diplomats from a variety of countries. I attended cultural events and functions as well as tribal fairs, weddings, and inaugurations. I tried to see as much of India as possible touring power plants, plantations, temples, military bases, factories, jails, villages, and even a metal foundry. Beyond providing numerous international contacts and countless hours of experience with educated discussion, my time in India is changed how I perceive politics, humanity, culture, and charity.


Rotary & Shelter Box Renew Partnership

Rotary Gives \$100 Million to Eradicate Polio

Rotary is giving \$100 million in grants to support the global effort to end polio, a vaccine-preventable disease that once paralyzed hundreds of thousands of children each year.

The funding comes as Rotary and its partners in the [Global Polio Eradication Initiative](#) (GPEI) address the final—and most pressing—challenges to ending poliovirus transmission, and as Nigeria approaches three years without any reported cases of wild poliovirus, bringing the Africa region closer to polio-free status. News from Rotary International

It's an Honor—In April, Rotary was honored by two organizations for its work to end polio:

UNICEF USA presented Rotary with the [Children First Award](#). General Secretary John Hewko says it's "a tribute to the perseverance of our members, and a reaffirmation of UNICEF's and Rotary's shared commitment to the world's children that they have every opportunity to live healthy, safe, empowered lives."

The Pan American Health Organization [recognized Rotary](#) for helping to eradicate polio in the Americas. The last case of polio was reported in Peru in 1991. The region was certified polio-free in 1994 and has remained so for 25 years.



Gates: Rotary Is The Reason Polio Will Be Eradicated

In a speech to a joint District 5030 and 5080 Conference on May 18, 2018, Bill Gates said, "We're going to get to the end of [polio] and Rotary will be the reason."

Just prior to the meeting, I had the opportunity to sit down with Gates and RI President Barry Rassin to discuss the unique partnership between the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and Rotary for a *Forbes* article.

The effort to eradicate polio is coordinated by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative—an entity that exists only on paper—comprised of Rotary, the Gates Foundation, the US. Centers for Disease Control, the World Health Organization and UNICEF. Within that global partnership, Rotary and the Gates Foundation work closely on fundraising.

The Gates Foundation continues to fund a \$2 for \$1 match of the money Rotary raises for polio eradication. In addition, the Gates Foundation provides additional funding to UNICEF and the WHO, the primary implementation partners for the field work involved in polio eradication.

In our conversation, I asked President Rassin how Rotary would respond to a request for help on another project from the Gates Foundation.

"We're in. I'll tell you that right now. This is a wonderful partnership," he said. Over the years, Rotary has raised \$1.9 billion in the polio effort, \$885 million of which came from the Gates Foundation. To put that in perspective, the

Gates Foundation—the largest private foundation in the world—has donated a total of \$3.7 billion, which includes the funds donated through Rotary.

Under Gates's personal leadership, the Gates Foundation led the development of a new vaccine that brings many of the benefits of the Salk and Sabin vaccines in one. Like the Sabin vaccine, it can be delivered orally. Like the Salk vaccine, it won't mutate into a form of the live virus. It will be uniquely powerful in ending outbreaks of circulating vaccine derived polio virus that can occur with about one in every five million doses of the oral vaccine.

Warren Buffett, Chairman and CEO of Berkshire Hathaway, is the third Trustee of the Gates Foundation, along with Bill and Melinda Gates. Gates told me that when he acknowledged to Buffett the challenges and delays with eradicating polio in Pakistan and Afghanistan, he responded, "You gotta keep going, you know."

Buffett's message is an important one for Rotarians. Gates explained in his speech in Spokane that if we ease up on our efforts, polio will return with a vengeance, potentially reaching hundreds of thousands of cases again within a few years. So far, 18 million cases of polio have been prevented. The goal remains the complete eradication of the disease so that no child will ever die or be paralyzed by it again.

RI President Rassin summarized the power of the Rotary-Gates partnership well. "The beauty of it is that we recognize that when we do things together, we can do so much more."



Last year: Total wild polio cases in 2018: **33**

AFGHANISTAN: The total number of officially reported WPV1 cases in Afghanistan in 2019 is 11.

PAKISTAN: The total number of officially reported WPV1 cases in Pakistan in 2019 is 45.

NIGERIA and THE LAKE CHAD BASIN:
No new cases of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) since 21 August 2016.
