your club has to meet only three of the six goals in each of the areas of: 1) Support and Strengthen, 2) Humanitarian Service, 3) Public Image and Awareness. Most of your clubs have probably already met three of the goals in each area. You just have to report it! Go to https:// my.rotary.org/ to enter your club's results.

Where does your club stand on per capita giving to The Rotary Foundation? Have you reached EREY giving status of \$100 per capita to the Annual Fund? If not, there is still time. Remember that one-half of your club's contributions to the Annual Fund will come back to our district

Here we are... nearing the end of anoth- three years from now. This is how we fund our district grants. Your club must make a contribution to the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund this year in order to be eligible for a district grant next year.

> How is your club coming on completing your current year projects? Remember that if you received a district grant for your project, a final report must be submitted. The final report form can be found at https:// www.rotarydistrict5670.org/page/district-grants.

There is only about a month and a half left in the Rotary year, but there is still plenty of time left for your club to finish out the year strong. Let's make the last year of District 5670 the best year ever!

Attracting Younger Leaders to Rotary

How can Rotary clubs reach more young people? What role should young leaders play in a club's recruitment strategy? LaShonda Delivuk, the 29-year-old president of the Rotary Club of Lynchburg-Morning, Virginia, USA, definitely knows something about younger leaders and attracting young people to Rotary.

When club leaders were asked recently about their biggest membership challenges, 31 percent said they struggle to motivate members to participate in club activities, volunteer for service projects, and serve in leadership roles. "There is this perception that you have to be perfect to be impactful in Rotary," LaShonda says. "But perfection doesn't exist. And we certainly don't need any 'perfect' Rotarians. What we need is a group of service-minded leaders who are willing to stand up as they are and simply



be present." She has modeled this in her own life by <u>being transparent</u> about how she leads her club while keeping her Rotary responsibilities manageable.

At this year's International Assembly, LaShonda took the stage to inspire the next class of district governors to think in new ways about Rotary and

the balance members are searching for. The key, she says, is "showing them you find their time to be valuable. If you can make Rotary worth someone's time, not only will we change Rotary, but we will change the world."

Holger Knaack to Serve as 2020-21 RI President



Holger Knaack, a member of the Rotary Club of Herzogtum Lauenburg-Mölln, Germany, has been selected to serve as president of Rotary International in 2020-21.

The Nominating Committee's decision follows the resignation last month of President-nominee Sushil Gupta due to health reasons. Knaack will officially

become president-nominee if no other candidates challenge him by 31 May.

To build a stronger membership, Knaack says Rotary must focus on increasing the number of female members and transitioning Rotaractors into Rotarians.

Knaack believes that the People of Action campaign of-

fers new public awareness possibilities for Rotary. "This campaign conveys our global image while still respecting differences in regions and cultures," he says.

A Rotary member since 1992, Knaack has served Rotary as treasurer, director, moderator, member and chair of several committees, representative for the Council on Legislation, zone coordinator, training leader, and district governor.

He is an endowment/major gifts adviser and co-chair of the Host Organization Committee for the 2019 Rotary International Convention in Hamburg.

Knaack is the CEO of Knaack KG, a real estate company. He was previously a partner and general manager of Knaack Enterprises, a 125-year-old family business.

So, what can we do?

- We can plan for succession.
- · We can recruit for skills.
- We can educate on what benefits there are for being a Rotarian leader.
- We can encourage Rotarians that the opportunity to lead in a club is "Service Above Self".


