Message from 5670 District Governor Andrea Krauss

Rotary International is celebrating its 114th anniversary in February. Founded on February 23, 1905, in Chicago by Paul Harris, Rotary International now has 1.2 Million members and is the world's premier service organization. In this month's letter, I thought I would highlight some of the significant moments in the history of Rotary.

Paul Harris was joined by three other men, Gustave Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram Shorey, in forming the Rotary Club of Chicago. By 1910, there were a total for five Rotary clubs. In just seven short years, Rotary became an international service organization with the addition of clubs in Winnipeg, Manitoba and Dublin, Ireland. By 1925, Rotary International had grown to 200 clubs and 20,000 members. Most of the clubs in District 5670 were chartered during this period of rapid growth. The Rotary Club of Salina is the oldest club in District 5670, founded on March 1, 1917.

The Four-Way Test was developed in 1932 by Herbert J. Andrea Krug Krauss, DG 5670 Taylor, a Rotarian and President of the Club Aluminum Company of Chicago. Mr. Taylor developed the test as a set of guiding principles for his company. In 1943, it also became a set of guiding principles for Rotary International. When Mr. Taylor became Rotary International President in 1954, he transferred the copyright to Rotary International.

Rotary was for many years an exclusively men's organization. The Rotary Club of Duarte, CA inducted three women members in 1976. In retaliation, Rotary International revoked the club's charter in 1978. The Duarte club sued and the issue was finally settled in 1987 when the U.S.



Supreme Court ruled in favor of the club. However, it was two more years before the Rotary Council on Legislation voted to admit women in 1989.

In 1986, Rotary International adopted the Polio Plus project to eradicate polio worldwide. At that time, there were over 350,000 new cases of polio every year. So far in 2019, there have been only six reported cases: 4 in Pakistan and 2 in Afghanistan. The fight to eradicate polio continues,

but much progress has been made in the last 30 years. primarily due to Rotary's efforts.

As we celebrate this 114th anniversary of our great organization, it's important to remember how we got here. In commemoration of this anniversary, please consider giving a little extra to The Rotary Foundation, so that we can continue to do good in the world and in our local communities.

February is Peace & Conflict Resolution Month

Each day, conflict and persecution drive 44,400 people worldwide from their homes, according to <u>UNHCR figures</u>. Rotary's service projects, scholarships, and peace fellowships take action to address the underlying causes of conflict, which include poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.

During February, Rotary Peace and Conflict Prevention/ Resolution Month, think about service projects that can build peace and mitigate conflict. Rotary has many resources to get you started.

You can find support from our partners:

 The <u>Institute for Economics and Peace</u>, a leader in the study of peace and conflict, helps Rotarians, Rotaractors, and Rotary alumni address the causes of conflict and establish conditions that foster peace. Participate in IEP's Rotary Peace Academy, a free online platform that includes courses and interactive tools that illustrate how to mobilize communities and apply new peacebuilding methods to address the sources of conflict.

- Mediators Beyond Borders International works with clubs, districts, and Rotary alumni to increase a community's capacity to heal from conflict, reconcile differences, and prevent issues from escalating in order to bring about a more stable future.
- Peace Corps provides opportunities for Rotary and Rotaract clubs to work alongside U.S. volunteers in the humanitarian development sector to empower communities and connect them to resources for a brighter future. Read the <u>Rotary-Peace Corps partner-ship fact sheet</u>.

World Water Day—March 22



World Water Day is fast approaching! Your club and district can help celebrate World Water Day. It focuses on the approximately 1.8 billion people worldwide who must rely on water contaminated

with feces, putting them at risk of contracting cholera, dysentery, typhoid, polio and other waterborne diseases.

The UN's Sustainable Development Goals, launched in 2015, include a target to ensure everyone has access to safe water by 2030, making water a key issue in the fight

to eradicate extreme poverty. In 1993, the UN General Assembly designated March 22nd as World Water Day. It is now a globally recognized event.

Members of the **Russell** and Hill City clubs as well as Russell Interactors will be in Guatemala on World Water Day distributing water filtration systems to people living in remote areas without access to clean water. I

A Clear, Concise & Meaningful Vision for Rotary Leadership

Vision is when architects dream of new buildings and designs. Or when business people dream of growing their business. Or how Rotary leaders share the story of how to increase service to others and bring in new Rotarians to our ranks – making our communities and clubs stronger.

So why is Vision important in Rotary Leadership?

- Vision shows us where we are headed.
 As a leader you must look forward and see where you and the club are headed.
- 2. Vision provides motivation and inspires us to keep on going.

Leaders need to keep the results in mind. A leader's vision needs to be strong enough to carry them through to the end. Otherwise your club will stop short of its goals.

3. Vision helps to keep us moving forward and move through obstacles.

If a leader has a strong vision, little setbacks and obstacles will seem small and / or insignificant. Vision helps leaders to persevere.

4. Vision provides focus.

With all of life's distractions, and people vying for their attention in many ways, it can be hard to feel a sense of accomplishment. As a leader, acting on your vision will provide you with the focus needed to accomplish your club's goals.

Vision gives us meaning and purpose to what we do.

As a leader, it will help you to see the end result of your efforts. It will give you your "why?" and the reason that you are doing what you do. It provides a purpose for every Rotarian in every club.

So, as we enter into the season of planning for a new Rotary year; as we plan for change in Rotary leadership at every level; as Rotarians contemplate the value Rotary has in their lives; and, as we experience a renewed sense of excitement; let's seize the moment by developing a strong vision, set goals based upon that vision and give an opportunity to all Rotarians to engage in a new way in Rotary.


