
Message from District Governor Ivanhoe Love, Jr.

Interact—West Wichita Club Report


West Wichita Interact Club

ended this school year at the last April Meeting on April 18th. Here's a report of the club's success in 2022-23, provided by Randy Bowles, Interact sponsor of the club.



Students participated in 12 different serving opportunities: Grocery deliveries, Bookshelves, Park Clean up, City wide meal packing event, Food Drives for Paxton Blessing boxes, and multiple Map paintings.

All together the group of 20 students had 418 hours of community service to Rotary Projects, meetings, and events.





- Started the year with 1 student.
- Had 30 guest students and 20 that became regular members attending multiple meetings or attending service projects.
- 3 students received scholarships from the club of \$1.000 each
- 5 students attended other Rotary Club meetings outside of Interact

Bank sponsored a community-wide Shred Day at the end of April.



Reconciling Truth & Fairness

As Rotary members, we're encouraged to apply <u>The Four-Way Test</u> to everything we think, say, or do. And yet many Rotarians fixate on just the first part of the test – "Is it the TRUTH?" – and stop there. It's easy to see why. Truth is an absolute. But fairness, as embodied in the second part – -"Is it FAIR to all concerned?" – is not.

In society today, the goal seems to be to win at all costs. Individuals sometimes seek to skew the truth to achieve an outcome "fair" to them but not necessarily fair to all concerned. Some people feel that if they win, it IS fair, but if they lose, it's NOT. They'll play fast and loose with the truth to achieve the result they deem "fair." Which begs the question, "Which is more important – truth or fairness?

He will be working to bring the Foundation story to Rotarians across four districts and supporting the work of District Foundation Chairs, including D5680's Donna Meier-Pfeifer.
