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
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## Message from District Governor



The rest of the days consisted of smaller breakout sessions, all divided into hosting DGEs who speak a common language. Those were the sessions where we rolled up our sleeves and got to work learning the

nuts and bolts of Rotary, dealing with matters we would or could face as District Governors, and discussing together ways to resolve these issues.

Every breakout session was not

only different in subject matter, but after each session we all were moved into another room, with different DGEs in that session. So no two were the same, and in each session I met different DGEs from differing countries. It sure did keep things interesting and lively. In one session I may be sitting with DGEs from Italy, the Netherlands, Canada, India, and Scotland, and in another I would be sitting with other DGEs from the US, Germany, Croatia, Pakistan, and France. And so many more.

I remember one very interesting breakout session involving resolving conflict and dealing with cultural differences, and sitting to my left was a Muslim DGE from Pakistan and to my right a Jewish DGE from Israel. And we were put together into a small breakout group, whereby the three of us very calmly discussed our assigned problem and worked out a solution to present to the rest of the group. That really brought home to me how Rotary can truly make a positive impact on world peace and conflict resolution, when so many people from so many differing and historically confrontational cultures can unite together for the common good. And make a difference.

Rotary strongly believes in thorough training and preparation of its leadership, and recognizes the powerful impact that spouses can have in the success of the District Governor, so much so that RI has a full training track specifically for spouses during the International Assembly, and fully funds their attendance. And the invaluable assistance and support a motivated spouse can provide to a District Governor cannot be overstated.

Every evening there was a formal dinner and organized event, the most popular one being the talent night, where DGEs perform native dances or other programs reflecting their country or cultural identity. The other DGE's in our Zone banded together, and all being geographically Midwestern or Western in the US, we performed a passable version of "The Cotton-Eyed Joe." And a great time was had by all.



Lori and I had an opportunity to meet RI President-Elect Ravi and his wife, and to join them in a small-group lunch. And the number of Past RI Presidents in the house was unbelievable. It seemed everywhere we turned we ran into another one, and each of them were the most gracious and helpful people you could ask to meet. It was a nearly overwhelming experience. And our DGE Dean and his lovely wife Cheryl have recently returned from this self-same experience, motivated and inspired to carry the torch into the next Rotary year.

The International Assembly was the first event I attended in Rotary that really brought home the worldwide power and international flavor of Rotary, and made an impact that will forever stay with me. It really showed me the truth of our RI Theme for this year, of how we can all work together to "Be A Gift To The World."

When you place 540 District Governor-elects and spouses from all over the world in one place, you are going to have

the OVATION factor! This doesn't even count the Rotary trainers from all over the world pouring information into us like salt into a salt shaker.

Rotary International President-elect John Germ made the announcement early of his theme, "Rotary Serving Humanity". What a great theme since that is exactly what we saw and heard about the entire week! ## Effective Delegation & Engagement

Author Donna Genett, in an article *Mastering Delegation Executive Excellence*, April 2003) identifies three rules for effective delegation:



1. Allow plenty of time to discuss the project and encourage questions.
2. Be specific
3. Create checkpoints with your delegate

As we begin to prepare for the new Rotary year, we have a couple of opportunities for planning and putting the right person on the right seat on the Rotary Bus. PETS offers us the opportunity to think deeply about the impact Rotary makes in our community, how to improve our programs of service and networking, and for incoming Presidents to explore their Club and personal goals to ensure alignment. Shortly thereafter, we have the District Assembly, a truly working meeting of Club officers and members coming together to have fun, learn from each other and to specifics to the goals thought of and developed during PETS. Finally, we have the fall District Conference, a time for all Rotarians to gather to celebrate and network; as well as learn from Rotary leaders.

*Engagement is the key.* It might be helpful to analyze your club's membership to see where members fall on the five levels of being engaged:

I'm not engaged, I'm somewhat engaged, I'm engaged, I'm very engaged and I'm extremely engaged. We encourage you to first define the above stages for your club. Second, identify what your club's expectations are for engagement. Finally, decide if changing your expectations will help to increase engagement. Begin with individual members' engagement, for a rising tide raises all boats. Then as the engagement improves, use effective delegation to move specific members to levels of unexpected leadership.

Rotary is our opportunity to give back, while receiving business and personal connections that will last a lifetime. Let's capitalize on this opportunity.



## Rotary Peace Centers—Developing Tomorrow's Leaders

In support of Rotary's commitment to making peace possible, in 2002, The Rotary Foundation partnered with top universities around the world to establish The Rotary Peace Centers. The Rotary Peace Centers program identifies highly qualified professionals and, through academic training and practical field work, prepares them to address the root causes of conflict.

Since the program's inception, more than 930 Rotary Peace Fellows have earned a Master's Degree or Certificate in the field of peace and conflict resolution. These leaders go on to professional careers in leading NGOs, government agencies, universities and other global institutions where they work to create peace and cooperation in their communities and abroad.

One Rotary Peace Fellows working to prevent conflict and build understanding is Rotary Peace Centers alum Kevin Melton. Kevin graduated from the University of Queensland and went on to work at renowned institutions including USAID and NATO. He has since joined fellow Peace Centers alum Cameron Chisholm at the International Peace and Security Institute (IPSI). At IPSI, Kevin and Cameron promote feasible and effective solutions to violence and instability in areas affected by extremism.


