Different thinking requiring different people working together in different ways.


New members will help bring in different thinking, different people and different ways; however, that is only the start.

Step 3: **Build the Right Team** – Identify people who contribute knowledge, insights and ideas





Step 5: **Evaluate Ideas** – Use agreed upon criteria to prioritize ideas for development

Step 6: **Take Action** – Create an action plan that holds individuals and club accountable

Step 7: **Get Smarter** – Embed the experience in our club's culture

The Elephant in Rotary's Living Room

In my travels as a newly fielded district governor, I've run into a misperception that several clubs have told me is getting in the way of membership growth.

The elephant in the room? ATTENDANCE

Let's step back. Several years ago, Rotary's Council on Legislation declared that almost ANY legitimate Rotary activity qualifies as a make-up. This includes notonly attending another club's meeting, but also a committee meeting or board meeting, working on a project (some clubs say for at least one or two hours), etc. "Etc." means anything that can reasonably be called a Rotary service activity. Now, of course to get "credit" for a make-up, the member has to report that qualifying activity to the club secretary. Most clubs use a sign-in sheet at a committee meeting or project and then forward the whole list to the secretary.

Measuring Engagement

Why did the Council do that? Because the point of tracking attendance is not to make people come to meetings. When measured this way, it's a measure of engagement — a key performance indicator of how your Rotary club is doing at involving members in Rotary activities. Believe me, we have the data to prove that when a member isn't engaged and involved in the club, it's a short trip to a resignation letter. Look at your members' attendance percentages. Those at the bottom of the list are thinking about

resigning. What can you do to get them engaged, involved, and — hopefully — passionate about something the club is doing?

More importantly, tracking engagement (attendance is a surrogate) is an important way of ensuring that members get the return on their Rotary investment that they deserve. Members who don't show up for club activities aren't getting the benefit of Rotary, and if we can identify those folks early, we can intervene and get them involved in something they're interested in.

Participation versus Attendance

So, let's not only treat attendance as a key performance indicator for engagement but let's explain it the same way to prospects. Rather than, "You have to attend four meetings a month," say, "We expect you to participate in some Rotary activity four times a month — you pick the activity that works for you, and you pick the time." I think that's a whole different message, and actually what we're attempting to promote and measure.

It's not about making people come to meetings. It's about offering them a platform where they, in their own ways and based on their own preferences, can *Be a Gift to the World*.

Africa Polio-Free for one year—August 11 marked one full year without a single case of polio in Africa. Africa's last case occurred in Somalia on Aug. 11, 2014. When Africa goes 3 years without a case of polio, WHO will certify the region as polio free.

A Simple Way to Make a Legacy Gift—Life

Insurance can be a great way to make a generous gift to charity. Many people have policies that are no longer needed to provide for loved ones. They may not think of these policies as assets available for charitable giving. What could be simpler than naming The Rotary Foundation as the beneficiary of an insurance policy? Consider turning an unneeded policy into a gift that helps secure the future of The Rotary Foundation.

Rotary has a Gift Acceptance Policy that covers insurance gifts. Here is a summary for your quick and easy reference:

- Anyone can name The Rotary Foundation as the beneficiary of any life insurance policy, at any age, for any amount. The gift might not qualify for recognition or tax benefits, but the proceeds will ultimately support the many important activities of the Foundation, such as clean water or peace studies.
- To be recognized as a Benefactor or Bequest Society membership a person can name The Rotary
 Foundation as a primary beneficiary of an insurance policy other than a term life policy. Due to the short-term nature of term policies and the uncertainty of contingencies, Rotary does not provide Benefactor or Bequest Society recognition for term or contingent policies.
- Rotary can accept ownership of an insurance policy if The Rotary Foundation is named as sole beneficiary and the insured is within 15 years of actuarially calculated life expectancy. The Trustees set this policy based upon a cost-benefit analysis, taking into account the cost of administration and other reporting requirements. If approved and otherwise qualified, the donor is recognized with **Major Donor** recognition and may receive some tax benefits.
- TRF does not actively promote the purchase of new insurance policies for the purpose of making a gift to Rotary, however, TRF staff are available anytime to discuss the donor's objectives.
