# Ukraine Delegates Visit Wichita

Three Ukrainian leaders, participating in the Open World Program, spent November 4-12 in Wichita examining the

theme: Administration of Healthcare Facilities. The Ukrainians were hosted by Rotarians from the West, East and



Downtown clubs.

While in Wichita, the delegates met with local leaders to share ideas and experience for supporting their work in Ukraine. Their program included visits at the Kansas College of Oste-

opathic Medicine, University of Kansas Medical School, Starkey, Ascension Via Christi hospitals, Red Cross, the Kansas Health Foundation, Catholic Care Center, Guadalupe Clinic, Interim Home Health and Hospice, Medical Loan Closet, Resthaven Mortuary and with several medical practitioners (chiropractor, pediatrician, podiatrist, family practice, pain medicine, and cardio-thoracic surgeon). Cultural activities are planned for them as well, such as

The team from Ukraine presented programs at the Rotary Clubs of West Wichita and East Wichita. They shared their knowledge and first-hand experience of what it's like being in the medical profession at times of war. The visiting delegates were:

# East Wichita Recap—Ukraine Program

As of November 1, 2022 more than 1,100 healthcare and medical institutions have been damaged or destroyed in Ukraine as a result of the Russian invasion, which began on February 24, 2022. Today's speakers were here as a result of the "Open World" program, which was founded in 1999 by then-Librarian of Congress James Billington. Rotary International receives a grant from Congress to fund the program and reimburse participating clubs for their expenses.

Another consequence of the invasion is the destruction of the energy infrastructure, which has led to many challenges as medical professionals continue to offer healthcare while protecting their facilities. According to our speakers, medical staff do bear arms to defend their country. Going through the pain

Through Open World, Rotary clubs in 280 U.S. cities have hosted nearly 4,000 of the program's more than 29,000 total delegates. The program is geared toward the exchange of knowledge, with accountable government, social and health issues, and special education remaining at the core of the program (*Information courtesy of RI*)

The delegates shared the progress that has been made to restore healthcare and facilities since the Russian invasion. Healthcare facilities were specifically targeted in the invasion. Both patients and medical personnel have been attacked. In addition, hospices and houses for seniors have been destroyed.

As a result, people have moved to the western part of Ukraine, with many of them living on hospital grounds. In

and challenges of this war has united Ukrainians as they fight back.

Our guests expressed gratitude for the assistance that Rotary clubs throughout the world and American citizens have provided. As fellow Rotarians, it is our continuing hope and prayer that peace will be restored soon in Ukraine and that its citizens can once again live in freedom.

**Oksana Lutska** - "This trip broke my stereotypes about life in the United States and about healthcare in the United States. Everything is much more interesting and nuanced than I imagined"

**Oleksandr Fizer** - "It is difficult to fit the entire volume of impressions and emotions into a few sentences, but I am going to give it a try anyway: The trip broke my stereotype about how goals may be achieved through actions of one team, rather than at the expense of individual qualities. A leader must be able to create a team, unite it, and listen to different opinions.

Secondly: I am extremely impressed by the openness and sincerity of the Rotarians and their desire to change the world for the better. From now on I will try to follow their principles as much as I can, in my own life"

**Yurii Ordynsky** - "My initial contact with Rotarians occurred at the beginning of the war in Ukraine: I observed how organized and purposeful the organization of aid for Ukraine can be, how a team of caring people constantly had a great desire to help.

Once I got to the US and met members of Rotary in person I saw with my own eyes how open, organized and purposeful the people are. The meetings in the clubs that we visited were incredible in terms of emotional connection and support.

We had the honor to present our country and highlight the problems that arose in the medical field from the Russian invasion. All meetings ended with great interest and desire to support Ukraine.

I was impressed by the 4 principles of Rotarians (The Four-Way Test), with which every meeting began, and I will definitely use them in my everyday life and work.

Regarding the organization of the meeting program: we are in awe of what we saw, the program is completely

balanced, which gave us an opportunity to understand the organization of healthcare in the USA - from primary care to highly specialized care. Thank you for the warm wel-come!"

**Maria Moskovko**, facilitator - "It was a very special and humbling experience for me to facilitate a delegation of Ukrainian medical professionals at the time of war. I got to witness how eager, excited and motivated they were to learn from each of the meetings, conversations, and site visits. I, together with the delegates, also got to experience great hospitality and support from the members of Rotary International, who were hosting us, as well as the people we met in the local community. The program was very well designed to fit the interests of each of the group members and to immerse the visitors into the different aspects of the healthcare system in the US.

We would like to thank everyone who devoted their time to planning the program and/or meeting with us in person."
