Message from District Governor Dean Kennedy


Dear Dream Team,



bly had some of those clubs in our District then, but times have changed and so have the Rotary Clubs. I know and you know that Rotary is doing good in your community and world but the question becomes, do non-Rotarians know that and what are we doing to inform them? Rotary joins leaders, shares ideas, and takes action.

This article is going to deal with several of our changes in Rotary that are here or coming. Is your club ready for those changes? How flexible are your membership options? Here are four ways to implement the new options for membership flexibility approved during the 2016 Council on Legislation.

 Change your meeting schedule—you can change the date and time of your club meeting or have groups that meet at different times and places as long as you meet twice a month.





4. Invite Rotaractors and young professionals to be members of your club.

These changes may require you to update your bylaws but anything is possible if you dream a little. This is the year that we increase membership in District 5690!

Another change this year is in the grants area. Each club will be provided a grant to cover the cost of one student to attend RYLA. All you have to do is recruit the student and get them to RYLA (Rotary/ Southwestern Youth Leadership Camp) which will be held May 30 to June 3, 2017 at Southwestern College in Winfield. 

Footprints Not Fingerprints



At a recent Club meeting, I heard a fellow Rotarian say that Rotary should leave footprints not finger-prints. This idea has

stayed with me and I pass this along so

that we can think about the footprint we make as leaders in our community and the footprint we make through our service above self.

The essence of this idea is that we should always be thinking what long-term, sustainable impact are we having on others through the work that we do. Do we do a "flash-in-the-pan" type of project or are we strategically thinking of how we are bettering lives. How do we do this? We understand the importance of purposeful planning — looking at what is truly a need

and not just an observation of a member. We commit to environmental scanning – the fancy concept of understanding our community, its resources, its culture and its politics. We reach out to others and find strong part-

ners (businesses, non-profits, education, etc.) and work with these partners to develop the responses that will be sustainable and create the most positive impact. Finally, each Rotarian needs to commit to using her/his professional skills in their formal/informal leadership within the club.

We have many great opportunities for Rotarians and Rotary Clubs across District 5690 to leave footprints! Keep on walking forward to a better community.

Bill Gates to Keynote RI Convention in Atlanta



Bill Gates, co-chair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, will speak at this year's Rotary International Convention June 10-14 in Atlanta, Georgia, USA. The convention is expected to attract

40,000 Rotary club members from over 160 countries, and inject an estimated \$52.3 million into Atlanta's economy.

Often described as a "mini-United Nations", Rotary's third convention in Atlanta will transform the Georgia World Congress Center into a cultural kaleidoscope as the organization's global network of volunteers gather to exchange ideas on how to improve lives and bring positive, lasting change to communities around the world.

Registrants will engage in workshops and hear from a lineup of world-class speakers, including Bill Gates, co-chair, of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. The Gates Foundation and Rotary International have an ongoing match of 2:1 to support polio eradication efforts up to \$35 million a year. Today in <u>Bill and Melinda Gates' Annual Letter</u> they reaffirmed the important role Rotary has played in polio eradication.

"Rotary and the Bill & Melinda Gates
Foundation have been working together
on polio eradication for a long time, and
our strong partnership will continue
through the final years of the effort," said
Rotary International President John
Germ. "With the most effective resources
in place, it's possible that we will soon
see the last case of polio in history. At the
convention, Bill will say more about how
we can — and will — end polio."



District 5690 was presented with a special certificate recognizing our district for its generous contribution of District Designated Funds to End Polio Now: Make History Today Campaign.



Rotary Releases \$35 million to combat Polio

Rotary has released another \$35 million in grants to support the global effort to end polio. Nearly half of the new funds, \$16.15 million, will support emergency response campaigns in Nigeria and the Lake Chad Basin, where four cases were detected last year after Nigeria had previously gone two years without a case.
