

So, here is a short list of things we want you to be aware of and engage in:



1. **A Club challenge to raise funds for Shelter Box, USA.** The challenge asks each Rotarian to donate \$10.00 to Shelter Box, USA to help in Haiti relieve and recovery. 2. Promoting the eradication of Polio and recognition of **World Polio Day on October 24th**. See more information regarding this initiative elsewhere in the issue of the newsletter.
3. Encouraging fellow Rotarians to attend the **upcoming District Conference**. You don't want to be a missing piece of this Rotary puzzle. The conference is October 29/30 in Wichita, Kansas. See details about the

conference elsewhere in this issue of the newsletter and/or go to our district website (www.rotary5680.org) to learn more and register for the conference. **REGISTRATION DEADLINE is Friday, October 22.** NOTE: Presidents – you have been given

the number of electors each club has (based on July 1 membership numbers) and a code for those electors to use to waive the registration fee.

Please limit giving the code to only the number of club members attending as official electors. All other Rotarians must pay the registration fee.

4. In conjunction with the district conference, Rotarians can participate in the **Rotary Leadership Institute**. This is an educational track within the conference. RLI is a good experience for any Rotarian, but it is especially useful for future club/district leaders. Go to the district website and click on the conference link to register for RLI.
5. One of the fun elements of the district conference is the **Silent/Live Auction** during the Saturday dinner. We ask that each club bring an item for the auction and recommend item price to be between \$100.00 - \$150.00. ALL PROCEEDS GO TO THE RI FOUNDATION. Everyone wants to be a winner!

ADDITIONAL CONFERENCE INFORMATION:

1. Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) is an educational track of the District Conference. RLI participants will join all other conference attendees for meals, receptions and keynote speakers.

RLI begins promptly at 1:00 p.m. on Friday, October 29th. This is a different start time from the other district conference events. **Rotary District 5680 is subsidizing attendees of the RLI track \$50 to attend RLI** Presidents, do not register your RLI attendees as an Elector.

2. We will have a silent/live auction. We ask clubs to

bring an item to be auctioned off with an estimated value of \$100.00 - \$150.00.

3. The conference agenda includes a service project. We are collecting packages of toilet paper (recommend packages of 30+ rolls) and ask each attendee to participate. During Saturday, we will re-package the rolls into distributable packages. These are given out, along with other hygiene items, to those in need.
4. We will remember those Rotarians who have passed since our last conference, last October. If you club has had one or more deceased Rotarians, send their name(s) to me ASAP at fred@leadingandteaming.com

The Rotary Clubs of Kansas and Missouri are thrilled to present the 1st annual **Students Stopping Traffic** contest. This competition invites students to use their endless creativity to help end child trafficking in our communities.

Why is this competition so important? Child trafficking is all too easy to ignore. Too often, we believe it can only happen overseas, far away from our friends, family, and community. That's a dangerous myth.

In fact, child trafficking is happening right here in Kansas, Oklahoma and Missouri.

Contest Overview: Students will work independently or in teams using their creativity to stop child trafficking. "Traffic stopping" ideas must be submitted by December 15th, 2021 to submissions@studentsstoppingtraffic.org. Finalists will be asked to present their ideas (via video conference) to a panel of judges who will select the winning ideas!

Submission ideas can be:

1. An advertising campaign educating kids on signs to look for.
2. A live event that puts a spotlight on child trafficking.
3. A social media initiative getting other kids to join the cause and share information.
4. Or something even bigger that no one has thought of yet!

Join Us for World Polio Day




To celebrate World Polio Day on **October 24** promote awareness of Rotary's polio eradication efforts, raise funds, and plan club events. Let's engage our communities in the


Dane Estok New PHS Member

Ever Closer to Ending Polio Now—We Can Help

Congratulations to all Rotarians in KS OK District 5680! Together with fellow Rotarians worldwide, we did our part to End Polio by raising, including all available matches from the Rotary International World Fund, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and others, over \$528,000.

Together, all of US raised the full \$50 Million Gates Foundation challenge amount for 2020- 2021. The amount Our District raised will, at \$3 per child, fully immunize (Polio+) over 176,000 of Our World's precious children!

As District PolioPlus Chair again this year, I am extremely pleased with those results and am excited to see what WE can do this year! This year's End Polio Now Campaign is dedicated to PDG Dr. Paul Nelson, beloved pediatrician and past End Polio Now chair for many years.

It is essential that all of us undertake planning of this year's Club PolioPlus Projects. Carrying out those Projects lead-



ing up to or around World Polio Day on October 23, would add to the excitement. Last year RI President Elect Jennifer Jones joined us live at our Virtual District Conference, as she literally went around the World, celebrating victories over Polio.

WOW! This year's Zone Institute was a "BLAST"

This year's Zone Institute was hosted in Houston, Texas, and the meeting had a space theme "Blast Off – Launch Rotary". Several D5680 Rotarian leaders were involved with high impact training and good Rotarian networking. Our team tackled topics such as leading a district team, increasing and engaging members, compelling reasons for Foundation giving, and how to stop human trafficking. Additionally, the team was exposed to Shelter Box, Hot Meals, USA, and Rotary action groups focusing on literacy and education, empowering girls, fighting against slavery, ending polio, and hybrid planning among many others. It was training full of interaction and incredibly good information.

DGE Ivanhoe said of his experience, "the biggest take away and that I got from attending the Zone Institute this year is a better understanding that if the district is going to be successful in achieving its goals, as outlined by the strategic plan, it's going to require teamwork from all district leadership. This will mean that assistant / area governors need to communicate with their clubs and clubs with their AGs. The DG, DGE and DGN and district committee chairs will need to work in unison, which is central to success, while discovering ways to engage our members and extend Rotary's reach within the community, the district, country and the world."

Deb Minkler, Atwood Club President, relayed her experience by saying "I found myself in Houston, TX where I attended the 2021 Rotary Zone Institute; a leadership and learning opportunity that I never expected - learning from my fellow Rotarians, networking, meeting up with old



friends, as well as making new friends along the way. Learning how to be a better leader won't only help me, it will help others around me. I knew I wanted to grow more within Rotary but wasn't sure where that might lead. After attending this Zone, I felt moved to work with the public image committee and grow an organization that I believe in with my whole heart. Service

above Self not only changes other people's lives, but yours as well."

Rotarian **Joyce Heismeyer** said, "what an amazing experience I had attending the Membership track at Rotary Zone. As expected, there is no magic for attracting and retaining membership; however, it was a great reminder that sometimes the simple answer works. **JUST ASK!** Many members, me included, originally joined Rotary because a business associate or friend asked. We often stay in Rotary because of the connections we make. You never know what connections you will make when attending a Rotary event. I happened to meet the high school principal from my high school. For me, it was a great example of how Rotary connects us."

Rotary Zone Meeting in Houston

We have clubs and districts in Rotary, but did you know we also have “Zones”? A Rotary Zone is composed of groups of districts within a geographical area. D5680 is in Zone 29. Go to the [district website](#) to see what area our zone covers. The leader of a Zone is a Rotary Director. Susie Howe (TX) is our director.

District Leaders attend training workshops and hear inspirational speakers as they prepare to serve in their Rotary leadership roles. DG Fred Heismeyer, D5680 DGE Ivanhoe Love, DGN Gloria Homeier participated, as well as many other district leaders.

From DGN Gloria Homeier: One very impactful training that I took was on Human Trafficking. Human Trafficking is forcing someone to work or perform sex acts against their will. Rotary is taking on Human Trafficking like the eradication of polio. They know that they cannot stop this overnight but with educating Rotarians and pulling together the resources of all Rotarians we can start to put an end to Human Trafficking.

Kansas is a HUB for Human Trafficking with 1-70 running thorough the state. This is the corridor that transport victims from California to New York. In Kansas in 2017 over 470 individuals identified themselves as victims. We would all like to think this does not affect us – until it does. Until our child, our grandchild, our friend’s child or someone

else we know goes missing. The time to act is before it happens. As District Governor Nominee, I hope to put together programs that will educate Rotarians and find impactful solutions by collaborating with other agencies so that as Rotarians we can do our part to end Human Trafficking.
