meeting time on Wednesday, January 18, from 11:30- to 1:30, at the Garden City Community College who prepared the meal. The room was decorated with Rotary International flags, a collection of old song books and a table with

100 years of memorabilia. The celebration was emceed by President-Elect, Hunter Carson and Treasurer, Liz Scheopner. District Governor Ivanhoe Love Jr. spoke on the Future of Rotary and ended with a presentation of a certificate "Honoring 100 Years of Membership" from Rotary International President, Jennifer Jones.

Liz Scheopner, club Treasurer, gave the group a brief his-

tory of both Rotary in general and the local club with a little trivia game. Longtime members, Mike Collins (1980), Dave Jones (1991,) and Ray Purdy (1977), all shared some fond memories of years past. In Memoriam



The district was saddened to learn of the death of Past District Governor-5670 (2006-2007) **Bill King.** Bill was a long time member of the **Rotary Club of Great Bend.**

William T. "Bill" King, M.D., 87, passed away Wednesday, January 25, 2023, at the University of Kansas Health Sys-

tem - Great Bend Campus.

A resident of Great Bend for almost 60 years, Dr. King was the Chief of Staff and OB/GYN of Central Kansas Medical Center; as well as the Deputy Coroner for Barton County. During his 30 years of OB/GYN practice, Dr. King delivered 3,699 babies and performed 4,100 surgeries.

Dr. King was an Eagle Scout and a member of the First

Presbyterian Church, where he was a Deacon, Elder and Treasurer. He and Mary served as National Skippers for Presbyterian Mariners and led many Mariners in Mission work camps. In 1996, they served 10 weeks as medical missionaries in Pakistan.

Dr. King was very active in the community. He was a member of the Great Bend Chamber of Commerce, Great Bend Country Club, and Barton County Health Department Health Advisory Council. He served on the board of directors for Central Kansas Court Appointed Special Advocates, Great Bend Library, and Barton County Historical Society. He was also District Governor for Rotary District #5670, President and Secretary of Great Bend Rotary.

RITE—Rotary Intercounty Teacher Exchange

RITE Coordinator for Wichita and Sunrise Club member. Dalia Hale, Shelli Kadel and Armida Hight educated and entertained many area Wichita clubs about District 5680's commitment to this longstanding and important Rotary program.

Our District has participated in the Rotary Intercountry **Teacher Exchange Program** since 1996! The Inbound Program allows teachers of English from Panama and Argentina to

come to Wichita for a four-week immersion experience! The teachers stay in Rotarian's homes and get to have a real "native" experience while expanding their knowledge of the English language and American culture.

The Outbound Program allows for three Wichita teachers to head to Panama, also for a four-week immersion experience. Since our inception of this program, we have received 84 teachers from Panama and Argentina here in Wichita and have sent 74 teachers from Wichita to Panama.

This year's incoming RITE teacher, Dori, comes from Panama and has spent the past 4 weeks learning and working in area schools with other secondlanguage teachers in USD259. In addition, she has participated in many cultural activities. She shared her experiences with area clubs and expressed her appreciation for the opportunity.

We are now recruiting Outbound teachers to go to Panama for 4 weeks this summer.

An audience of nearly 250 attended including many dignitaries and local politicians to learn more. Wichita Mayor, Brandon Whipple, presented "Human Trafficking Awareness Month" proclamations from both the City of Wichita and the State of Kansas.

Michelle McCormick, State Attorney General's office, served as moderator. Panelists were: Jennifer White - ICT SOS; Alice Osburn - Sedgwick County District Attorney's office; Natalie Daemen - Wichita Police Department detective; Debbie Kennedy - Wichita Children's Home; and John Fer-

reira - Homeland Security Investigations.





A call to action by Rotarians was issued asking interested members to be part of a cross-club committee to research,

A Very Good Tired in Guadalajara!

In an interview, singer/songwriter Harry Chapin tells the story of his grandfather telling of being "good tired". This is when you lay your head down at the end of the day, exhausted, but filled with the knowledge that you did good for others.

Being "good tired" was the case for Joyce and PDG Fred Heismeyer as they participated in a week of Rotary service in Guadalajara, Mexico. Joining fellow Rotarians from Missis-



sippi, Tennessee, Alabama, Texas, Kansas, and Illinois (including Rotary International Director Elizabeth Usovicz), the team did medical, vision, and dental services for over 1,200 children and adults as well as construction projects which included installing water filters, sealing a roof, mixing and pouring a cement ramp and patio, sanding and varnishing 100 school desks, and painting five classrooms.



The week of service was an international service partnership of D6820 (Mississippi) and D4140 (Jalisco, Mexico) and continues a multi-year effort to help the poor in areas of Guadalajara. Joyce and Fred were invited to join this year's team by PDG Ed and Fran Thurmond. Fran and

Ed attended this year's district conference and were RIP Jennifer's representatives. While the work was hard, it was rewarding to see smiles on those who received glass-

es, had their teeth fixed, or received medical care for the first time in perhaps years. It was also heartwarming to have hugs from kids and adults alike for the work to improve their schools/community centers, and the words of gratitude from principals, teachers, and community representatives at the three schools and one community center.



However, the week was not all work. Fred and Joyce got to know and work alongside fellow Rotarians and joined the team for a tourist day at Tequila, Mexico (yes, the home of tequila) with tours of an Agave farm, tequila distillery, of course tequila tasting, and several dinners at wonderful restaurants, each evening full of laughter, fun, and music.

The chorus of the Up with People song "One to One" seems to sum up the experience for Fred and Joyce. It reads:

One 2 one, we change the world by giving to another A helping hand along the way


A simple act of love is what changes are made of

Rotary District 5680 (Kansas & Oklahoma) and Districts 1440, 1450, 1461, 1470, and 1480 (Denmark) Invite You To Join Them In Providing Clean Water To Ukraine



Our six Rotary Districts are cooperating to provide water purification units for communities devastated by the war in Ukraine. Each unit can provide 180 gallons per hour of clean water. We are creating the units to be portable or truck mounted so they can provide water to multiple neighborhoods or villages. Each unit costs \$4,000 (€3,900). Our goal is to provide a minimum of 50 units. We are partnering with District 2232 in Ukraine to distribute the units to areas hardest hit by the war's destruction of water purification facilities and power plants.



Will your club join us in this effort? Consider raising funds to provide one, two, three, or even more water purification units.
