2020 Derecho Relief Effort

DERECHO: A line of intense, widespread, and fastmoving windstorms and sometimes thunderstorms that moves across a great distance and is characterized by damaging winds.

The 2020 Derecho left many communities in its path with much destruction and for those in the Chicago region, a record number of 15 tornadoes spawned by 2020 Derecho. The Chicago areas most adversely affected included south suburban areas and Rogers Park, which is in Chicago and adjacent to Evanston, home of our Rotary International headquarters and home to many Rotary International Staff.

However, with everything in the news you may have missed the community that had Hurricane 3 Level winds and destruction was Cedar Rapids in Iowa. Their needs are great as they deal with major destruction of their community. Urgent needs include:

Rotarians Worldwide were thrilled to learn that the African region was certified wild poliovirus-free on August 25, 2020.

This certification was announced by the World Health Organization and is the result of a decades-long effort

across the 47 countries of the African region. It involved millions of health workers traveling by foot, boat, bike and bus, innovative strategies to vaccinate children amid conflict and insecurity, and a huge disease surveillance network to test cases of paralysis and check sewage for the virus.

This milestone is an incredible public health achievement for Rotary members, the African region, and our GPEI partners, and a huge step forward on the road to global polio eradication. But we still have important work to do in order to eradicate wild polio in the last two endemic countries.

The GPEI's challenge now is to eradicate wild poliovirus in the two countries where the disease has never been stopped: Afghanistan and Pakistan. Additionally, routine immunization in Africa must also be strengthened to keep the wild poliovirus from returning and to protect children against circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus, which is rare but continues to infect people in parts of the African region.

To eradicate polio, multiple high-quality immunization campaigns must continue to be given priority. Even during the COVID-19 pandemic, it's necessary to keep children vaccinated against polio while also protecting health workers from COVID-19 and making sure they don't contribute to its transmission.

Global health officials and experts say that sustained fundraising and advocacy are still crucial, not only to protect gains in Africa, but to reach the ultimate goal of a world without polio. Rotary members still have a critical role to play in keeping the African region free of wild poliovirus and eliminating the virus in the two countries where polio remains endemic.

of work promoting ShelterBox. According to ShelterBox, Marshall's work helped the organization in their efforts to provide supplies to more than 145,000 people in 11 countries.

Marshall has also been inducted into the ShelterBox Ambassador Hall of Fame (one of only 37 Ambassadors to do so) for helping \$100,000 over the span of his time as a volunteer. He (one of only 37 Ambassadors to do so). We featured ShelterBox and Marshall Stanton in our February 2020 and November-December and August 2019 newsletters.

How Can \$1.45 a Week Become \$1 Million to End Polio Forever?

What can my small amount of \$1.45 per week (\$75 in a year) do?

Our PolioPlus campaign is within a percent or two of 100% completion worldwide. All of Africa has been certified as free of the wild polio virus! Only Afghanistan and Pakistan remain, with the latter

now resuming PolioPlus vaccinations! So why is it so important that we finish it completely and ASAP?

It is so crucial because if we do not eradicate polio completely, it can come back and be more horrific than ever. Hundreds of thousands of additional young people each year could become victims to that emaciating and paralyzing disease. If so, it will make it very difficult for them to walk, play or work to support themselves, much less support a family. Both of my parents had polio and I feel very strongly about preventing others from having to endure the extra burdens that put on them!

So how can we keep moving PolioPlus forward in the middle of a worldwide pandemic caused by another virus? It's very simple, actually. If all of the Rotarians in our District donate an average of \$75 per member this year, **together**, with the Power of US, we can make a HUGE IM-PACT!

Let me explain. **Through** the world-changing **generosity of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation**, **your gift** and my gift and other Rotarians', are **matched 2 for 1**. That's right, **your \$75 gift becomes a \$225 donation** to help the final drive of PolioPlus.

But wait, that's not all! Because of the reserves built up in the **Rotary International World Fund**, your donation, already swollen to **\$225**, is matched yet again, not at the \$75 level, but at the \$225 level, doubling to **\$450**. That's right, your donation of **\$75** dollars results in a final contribution 6 times greater!

Just for fun, if you want to go over \$450 total, just toss in \$9 more and the total impact generated by your \$84 give is up to \$504. What will \$100 (or less than \$2 per week) do, you ask? Say no more, I'll show you:



\$100 X 6 = \$600.

What does it take to get \$1000?

Fun and simple:\$1000 divided by 6 = about \$168—pnly twice our \$84 total annual Gift.

For those feeling the urgency of the need and having a passion to meet it,

\$250 becomes \$1,500; 500 becomes \$3,000; 1,000 becomes \$6,000 and so on.

But if we will just pledge to encourage each other to meet our original goal of an **average of \$75 from each and every good Rotarian in our District** (approximately 2400 strong) the IMPACT looks like this:

2,400 Rotarians X \$75 each = \$180,000 (not bad, but surely we can hit \$200,000 or more); \$180,000 X 3 = \$540,000 (after Gates Super Match)

Then, \$540,000 X 2 = \$1,080,000 with World Fund Match; or over \$1.2 Million, if we average \$84 per member; and over \$1.4 Million, if we average \$100 per Rotarian.

Where else on Earth , can your humanitarian giving

have a 6 to 1 return? For any of you for which any of this is a stretch, please give what you can and consider teaming up on a Club PolioPlus Project. Consider your share of the time given to planning and carrying it out, as a very significant part of your donation to our Cause.

Sorry, I have to go now. Need to figure some ways to get my contribution up. Maybe if I quit buying lottery tickets. Oh, I guess I don't do that. Surely there's some bad habit I can cut back on. Or several?
