The Liberal Rotary Club is one of 60 in its district. Tuesday, the leadership of the district changed hands, and a local Rotarian is now heading up that

leadership.

Liberal's Ivanhoe Love Jr. was officially announced as the newest district governor for Rotary, taking over the job from outgoing governor Fred Heismeyer, who was on hand for Tuesday's meeting at Seward County Community College.

Prior to naming Love as the next district governor, Heismeyer talked about his year as the head of the Rotary district, and he pointed to the hours he and other club members have put into issues such as empowering girls, funded scholarships, distributed dictionaries, meals served, homes built and recreational spaces created, as well as advocating and promoting peace, protecting the environment, digging wells and giving shots.

Heismeyer said all of this is a measuring stick for how Rotarians change lives. He said his year in leading the district has been a memorable one, with he and his wife, Joyce, visiting the 60 clubs in the district and sharing stories of the work Rotary does.

"We saw first hand some of the lasting effects of Rotary's service has in our communities," he said. "We have shared our vision of Rotary, and we shared our vision of what worked to further engage our Rotarians in our program of service above self needs to happen."

Heismeyer likewise talked about work with fellow Rotarians to wrap Christmas gifts, pack food for distribution to local and international organizations and collect, sort and deliver items for refugees and low-income families.

"We continue to push to educate our fellow citizens on the plight of those caught in human and labor trafficking," he said. "We have worked tirelessly, I hope, to connect with the more than 2,200 Rotarians we have across the district." Heismeyer thanked everyone who made the past year memorable.

"Working as a Rotarian means working as a team, and we have had a great team," he said.

Heismeyer would later talk about his experiences working with Love.

"My first recollection of Ivanhoe was four or five years ago when our two merging districts came together to begin the process of visioning and strategic planning," he said. "I had the pleasure of sitting next to Ivanhoe and began to get to know his depth of commitment to service. Since that time, my admiration for Ivanhoe has only grown."

Heismeyer said Love works tirelessly to help those in need.

"He's up to his eyeballs and sometimes even over his head in service to this community," he said.

Love has spent the last year serving as district governor elect, and Heismeyer said this has prepared him for his new role as district governor.

"He has traveled to meet with clubs and district leadership, and lvanhoe is working hard to strengthen our area governor team to better support and to provide information to our clubs," he said. "He continues the commitment of all past governors to connect with fellow Rotarians, engage clubs in meaningful programs of service and support the work of Rotary across the globe. I honestly could not have asked for a better district governor-elect to stand beside me on this journey. Our district cannot have asked for a more capable and fully engaged governor as we begin to 'Imagine Rotary."

Before handing the mic off to Love, Heismeyer presented the new Rotary leader with the district governor's pin, and the outgoing governor talked about the significance of that pin.

"This pin helps us to remind ourselves, it's not about us," he said. "It's about those who came before us. It's about those who we serve with, and it's about the future of Rotary."

years preparing for Tuesday, and he said his success as district governor is dependent on his fellow Rotarians and their willingness to devote themselves to the causes of Rotary.

"If we can do that, we're going to move the district forward in such a manner that all of us will be proud of," he said.

Love later talked about the work of Heismeyer, who he said has put an apparatus in place to help in the recovery and aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"I'm really proud to step into this position behind him," he said. "He's made the road ahead of me much, much smoother. I'm going to be relying on him for his counsel, for his friendship and for being right next to a good bunch of people. You won't find a better person or people than Fred and his wife, Joyce."

Later, Love talked about Jennifer Jones, the first woman to be named president of Rotary International.

"She is going to be quite a force within the Rotary world," he said. "I've had the opportunity to meet with her, spend hours with her and understanding what she would like for the Rotary world to do. She has a tremendous responsibility. She's a Canadian, and she is a world traveler. She is a professional person and capable leader, and we're very fortunate to have the first woman in the history of Rotary assume that role."

Love said having Jones as president indicates Rotary's recognition of the importance of diversity, uplifting women throughout the world and preparing women to assume leadership roles.

"I think, to be honest with you, it's going to be a role model for organizations like ours to let women take the leadership roles," he said. "She has chosen as her motto, 'Imagine Rotary.' .' What she says is, 'Imagine a world that is free of disease. Imagine a world where we have clean water for everyone to drink. Imagine a world where we educate our children, all children, and empower them to be leaders."

Love began his remarks by saying he has spent the past two Love then asked those on hand what it would take to grow and sustain the Rotary district, and the answer was simple.

> "It must grow," he said. "We have to attract people like ourselves. We have to attract people of high moral value. We have to attract people who have the same ideals of life of service above self. We must identify these people."

Sustaining Rotary, Love said, also means getting more younger people involved.

"We have to get more members in order to do that," he said. "We have small clubs in our district struggling to make it."

Preserving the district, Love said, likewise involves understanding what communities want.

"We have to do analysis to figure out what projects within our community will give us the big impact to engage our efforts to make Rotary the club to me," he said. "We can do it, but it's going to take commitment from each of you sitting here."

Love said he is dedicated to the cause of Rotary and trying to help people around the world no matter where they are, the cost or need.

"If we can do things to help make our country a better place, I'm all in," he said.

America as a whole is divided politically, and Love said something must be done about that divide. He believes Rotary can be the platform to bridge the gap.

"We're too divided in the country," he said. "Rotarians are about doing good in the world. We are about helping each other regardless of our political persuasion. We must find a platform where we all can come together for the good of us all regardless of your political background. As Rotarians, let us encourage people in our community. Come to us. We will help you. We have devoted ourselves to helping people no matter what."

District grant applications for the 2022-2023 Rotary year are due July 31, 2022. District grant policies, forms, instructions, and other information about the district grants process is available on the Rotary District 5680 website at: https://rotary5680.org/page/grants-scholarships. If your club has an outstanding district grant for the 2021-2022 Rotary year, you must also submit a district grant report by July 31 in order to be eligible for a 2022-2023 district grant.

Failure to meet these deadlines and follow the district grant policies and application instructions will result in disqualification of your club's application. It is very important to read the policy and instructions prior to submitting an application.

What happens when 11,000 Rotarians get together, when international award winners in peace and justice speak about their experiences, where hundreds of causes are presented and demonstrated, and when Rotary leadership from around the world interact with fellow Rotarians? It's called the Rotary International Convention.

This year's convention, held in Houston, afforded several D5680 Rotarians to attend, learn, and experience Rotary in a unique way. And there is no better way for us to share the Rotary Convention experience than in the words of some of our attendees:

DGE GLORIA HOMEIER, "The Rotary International Convention lets you meet people from all over the world and lets you experience their culture and country through their descriptive words. Friendships are made that will carry on throughout life. I loved meeting all the Rotarians from different countries and hearing through conversations what Rotary is like in their country."

#### RC OF WICHITA PRESIDENT, MARK KOCH, "A couple

of things that left an impression. The impact that Rotary has had on Human Trafficking in countries where children are exploited is fascinating. Makes me question how we can make an impact on the problems with trafficking in America, when you have such a powerful force like Rotary tackling the mission.

As an exhibitor, I was not able to attend any of the sessions, however, as a Rotarian, I was able to make new friends and meet people from around the world. Thousands of people who are genuine and want to do something good in the world!"

**RC OF EAST WICHITA AND DISTRICT LOGISTICS CO-ORDINATOR JOYCE HEISMEYER**, "Two speakers stood out to me. First was the 11-year-old Orion Jean. He is the founder of the Race to Kindness. He focuses on how

everyone can spread kindness. He shared his philosophy of "if you see a problem, fix it". He ended his discussion with the message "Be KIND" K – Keep your eyes open; I – Include others; N- Nothing is too small and D – Do something about it. It was very meaningful to me to see someone so young act and make a difference.



Second was the astronaut, Charlie Duke, the last man to walk on the moon. He shared a lot about his experience as an astronaut. What stood out to me was how he ended his talk. He noted that he often read the book "On



Beyond Zebra" by Dr. Suess to his children. He made the analogy of how the character Conrad Cornelius O'Donald O'Dell stressed the importance of going beyond Z. If we end everything, we do with how we've always done it, we will never progress beyond what we already have. He encouraged all Rotarians to go beyond Z and explore what we can accomplish if we just go beyond Z and stretch our boundaries."

**PDG GERI APPEL,** "As a frequent attendee of RI Conventions who has never left disappointed, the Houston Convention was as usual inspirational and motivational. Several speakers especially personally touched my



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heart. Dr. Olha Paliychuk, a gynecologist and oncologist in Ukraine, representing a delegation of 7-8 Ukrainian Rotarians who made the long trip to be in Houston, gave an impassioned thank you to Rotary clubs and districts around the world for the assistance Ukraine and surrounding countries are receiving at this terrible time. The standing ovations she received as well as the ovation when the Ukrainian flag was presented as part of the "Flag Ceremony" were quite moving. <u>Read her comments here</u>.

The other speaker who deeply affected me was 2014 Novel Peace Prize winner Kailash Sayrarthi. His work around the world has "focused attention on the grave exploitation of children for financial gain" following the non-violent tra-



dition of Indian independence leader Mahatma Ghandi who we quoted throughout his mesmerizing talk."



A large number of our clubs are actually located in communities that have established YEC programs.


